

Extended 'Phone Service Defeated

Sandy has voted down extended service to Portland and Gresham.

Only 50.27 per cent of the ballots were in favor of the extended service, and not a "substantial majority" as required. The ruling was issued Wednesday evening by Public Commissioner Jonel C. Hill, within the usual 60-day period that allows for study of the vote by the commission staff.

The ruling was in the form of an order to West Coast Telephone Company to not provide the service that was sought by petition. The vote, which drew 907 ballots, was authorized following a public hearing in Sandy.

Sandy '11' Awaits League Opener Here

Sandy's Pioneers open league football play this Friday night at 8 o'clock with their third home game in a row. Opening Wilco League opponent for Coach George Potter's eleven will be the Parkrose Bronchos.

Like Sandy, the metropolitan area team has lost both its games. While Sandy was bowing to Central 7-6 and to Prineville 25-7, Parkrose dropped decisions to Redmond 31-0 and to Bend 33-0.

Jesuit high school, victor in both pre-season contests, is tagged as the pre-season favorite in the Wilco league.

Coach Potter, pointing to inexperience as the factor which allowed Prineville four big gaining plays here last week that accounted for the scoring. Of 277 yards gained by Prineville, 205 yards came on the four long plays. Potter pointed to Alan Fleishman on defense, and Larry Russell and Dennis Cutsforth on both offense and defense, as

the strongest links in Sandy's lineup Friday.

Starting lineup for tomorrow is the same except that Frank Emerson, who played most of last week's game following recovery from an injury, will probably be starting at left end. Potter said he hopes to have his squad "hustling harder" as a result of this week's workouts.

Fire Vote Located, New Problems Arise

Both the date and place of the election for the proposed rural fire district were officially confirmed by county commissioner Darrell Jones in a letter to Dean Wessellink last Thursday. Residents within the fire district boundaries will cast their votes at Shorley's Corner, Oct. 18 from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. While this confirmation was a welcome relief to the past weeks' confusion and indecision regarding the polling place, other misunderstandings continue to mount regarding the Budget Expended.

Wessellink said criticism has been aimed at the new district for stories in the Post about purchase of a \$30,000 fire engine. Wessellink said that fire engines range up to this figure, but that "we intend, under no circumstances, to spend in excess of \$14,000 for a truck."

However, all expenditures for the proposed district will be determined by the five-member board to be elected at Oct. 18, and "no promises can be made until then," he said.

Sandy Pioneer Perret Succumbs

Henry Aurl Perret, 76, a resident of Sandy for the past 54 years, died in his sleep last Thursday morning.

Born in Clarissa
He was born Nov. 30, 1884 at Clarissa, Minnesota, and moved to Dallas at the age of three. Three years later, the family settled in Boring and he attended school in Orient.

He worked for Vetch Brothers Dairy, later to become the Damascus Creamery. He owned and operated a blacksmith shop at Orient for several years.

He opened a blacksmith shop upon moving to Sandy in about 1907, and then owned and operated the Sandy Garage. Between 1933 and 1950, he was employed by Portland General Electric at Bull Run.

Building a House
Perret spent his later years as a carpenter and cabinet maker, and since his marriage to Bina in 1958, undertook building a house on Highway 26 east of Sandy.

Perret's civic activities included membership in St. Michael's Catholic Church, charter and 52-year membership of the Sandy Grange, vice-president of the Sandy Pioneers Association, and Sexton of Cliffside Cemetery for the past 20 years.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday at Carroll funeral home, and he was buried in Sandy Ridge cemetery. Surviving members of his family include his wife and four children, Arnon and George Perret, Portland; Mrs. Stanley Bacon, Eugene; and Mrs. Laurence Fenger, Portland; 11 grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Zoning Ordinance, Code Drafts Reviewed by Sandy Council

City Council and the Sandy City Planning Commission finally got together at a meeting last Monday night to review a proposed zoning ordinance and building code for Sandy, awaiting council approval since June.

The Planning Commission, with the aid of Frank Frost, Federal Director of Municipal Research, spent over a year on the ordinance.

Federal Funds Available

Frost said Monday that federal assistance is available for costs of establishing a building code. He said local funds, matched by \$2 for every local dollar, would provide Sandy an outright federal grant of \$2100. No action was taken on this.

The purpose of the code is twofold, according to Frost: (1) It stipulates the use of the land and (2) sets standards for the development of land—distance between and height of buildings, etc.

Study Precedes Draft
The planning commission draft followed study of detailed aerial maps of Sandy's commercial and residential layout and comparison of Sandy with other cities of the same size and population.

"Sandy has considerably more land per capita than most cities for commercial purposes," Frost said.

Oral Vaccine Clinic On JC Autumn Agenda

Mt. Hood Jaycees and Jayceettes will sponsor a series of three oral polio vaccine clinics beginning the last week of October. This is the first commercial oral vaccine available in the Portland area.

Each vaccine is a different virus, and will be administered at about two months intervals. These injections are eventually expected to replace the Salk vaccine because they provide permanent immunity, instead of necessitating periodical booster shots.

Dr. E. D. Leavitt of Sandy, coordinator for the local program, stressed that all persons, regardless of age or previous polio vaccination, should have the oral vaccine. He said that there are no ill effects from the doses.

Some 200,000 doses will be available to the Sandy-Mt. Hood area in late October, "but we do not know when it will be available in this area again," Leavitt said.

He further said that the oral dose is difficult to administer in the average doctor's office, because of handling and storage problems.

'Semi' Truck, Car Collide Near Sandy

A car was demolished Sunday 2 miles west of Sandy when a car, driven by James Paul Bell of Portland, swerved out of control and crashed head-on into a truck and semi-trailer outfit.

Bell told Police Chief James Barden that he was passing a pickup truck when his car went out of control, making it impossible to pull into his own lane.

The driver of the truck, Ernest Whitney of Seattle, said he tried to avoid the oncoming car by pulling onto the shoulder, but was clipped on the left front side, according to the police report. No damage was done to the trailer, but Whitney estimated that the tractor was completely wrecked.

Bell and a passenger, David West, also of Portland, were taken to Gresham General Hospital for treatment of facial lacerations.

Welches Petitions Answered

Welches residents have been promised a review of the postal service there in another three to six months.

This word was received from John Swygert, Acting Director of the Post Office Department's Bureau of Operations in Washington, D.C. His statement was in reply to a petition to post office and Congressional authorities by Welches residents this month.

The petition protested the manner in which Welches post office was closed in favor of rural carrier service from Memme, and asks that a rural station be established at Welches. Negotiations for such a station were initiated and then abandoned by the post office department in June.

Swygert stated that "indications are that the present service is adequate." He added, "After the new service has been in operation for a period of six to nine months we will resurvey the postal service in the Welches area and such action will then be taken as the facts developed may warrant."
