At Orient-- Community Club Meeting Slated Tonight; School Enrollment Up

The Orient Community club begins its 1961-62 parade of events tonight at 8 p.m. in the East Orient gym with the introduction of the entire personnel of Orient Grade school.

Several teachers are new this year and the evening will afford patrons the opportunity to meet them.

The Community club has a new slate of officers this year and they are anxious to get the year off successfully with a big turn out. New officers include Dean Gray, president; Len Brooks, vice-president; Beth Caldwell, second vice-president; Irene Ashford, secretary; and Doris Logging, treasurer.

Mrs. E. C. Edgar spent three days last week visiting in the home of the O. M. DeFoes at Rainier.

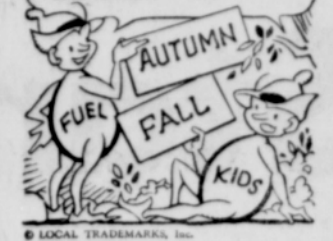
The Herbert Kumrows of Sherwood took his mother, Mrs. Emma Kumrow, on a four-day trip to the California Redwoods.

STANDARDS REVISED
Changes in Oregon filbert standards, effective Oct. 12, will recognize two Oregon grades, both of the same eating quality. The changes follow a hearing held in August. The grades are No. 1 whole and No. 1 whole broken. The whole - broken filbert meats may be of mixed varieties. The No. 1 whole meats must be of similar varieties; for example, all meats of the Barcelona (or round-type) group or all meats of the DuChilly (or long-type) group.

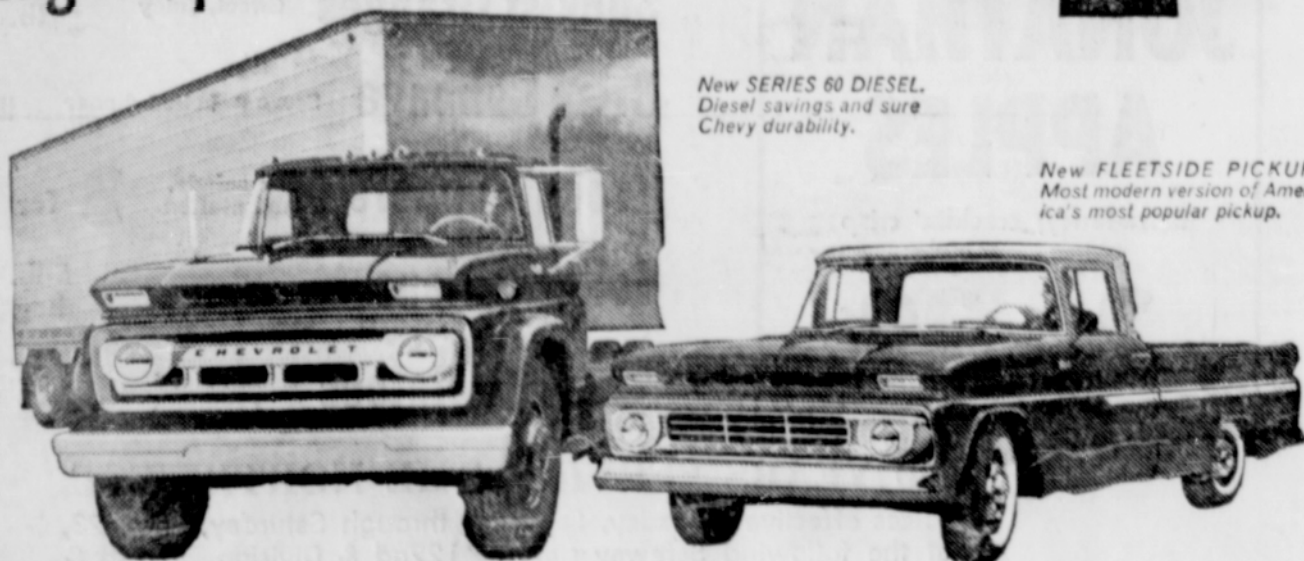
