## Booster Time... Health Board Urges Immunity Shots for Children, Adults

Oregon State Board of Health issued a reminder recently that it is important for parents to check the immunization status of their school children.

"School children are particularly susceptible to communicable disease because of greater exposure. All parents should absolutely determine that their children have their shots up-to-date," Carl L. Holm, M.D., president of the Oregon State Board of Health, declared.

Children ordinarily receive the required shots before they are one year old. This protection is not permanent and boosters are required periodically, Holm said.

Children entering school for the first time must be "boosted" against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and smallpox.

If they have completed one series of polio vaccine, a booster should be repeated every two years.

As a general rule, school children, and adults as well, should be "boosted" every five years against diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox; and every two years against polio.

Immunizations are an individual medical preventive and everyone should keep a record, the state board of health advises. Individual immunization record cards may be secured by all Oregon citizens from their private physicians or their local health department.

## B.C. Power Share May Be Exported

The sale of part or all of British Columbia's 1,300,000 kilowatt downstream share of Columbia river treaty power to Pacific Northwest private utilities was advanced recently by Charles F. Luce, Bonneville Power Administrator.

However, he suggested that if the Canadians decide to sell treaty power, Canada might look to the Pacific Northwest as well as California for a market.

The administrator suggested that Pacific Northwest private utilities might welcome, under certain conditions, a long term supply of power available from B.C. if the pending Columbia river treaty is ratified by the Canadian Parliament.

The B.C. Premier desires to export all or a large part of B.C.'s 50 per cent share of the new treaty power that would be generated at U.S. dams. Indications are that such power would not be needed by the province for 20 to 25 years.

## Careful Planning Insures Good Lawn

Time for lawn planting is now. From the present time until mid-October, lawns can be planted locally with success. But beautiful lawns don't "just happen."

Considerable planning, hard work and care are required for successful lawn planting, according to Ray A. McNeilan, Multnomah county horticulture agent.

As you wouldn't begin to build a house without blueprints, you should never start a lawn without plans, McNeilan advises.

### Cost Planning

A primary consideration in lawn building is cost planning. Grading and drainage, sprinkler systems, driveways and walks and commercial charges and costs should be recognized and prepared for well in advance. Sprinkler systems cannot be planned until it is decided where the walks and driveways will be. Walkways and drives cannot be placed until grades are established and drainage allowed.

Most soils will benefit from the addition of organic matter which increases moisture-holding capacity. Several types of materials can be used to increase soil organic matter. Sawdust, a slow decomposer, is useful for loosening heavy soils, however extra nitrogen must be added over a period of years. Easily decomposed materials such as well rotted manure, composts, and green manure crops also liberate some nutrients during the decomposition process.

### Drainage Important

Poor drainage, poor physical condition of the soil, compaction and wrong use of chemical or organic soil conditions all contribute to lawn failures. In preparing the soil for lawn planting, try to correct these difficulties.

### Ten Steps To Follow

Ten steps to follow in preparing and seeding a lawn are:

1. Grade the soil. Make the slopes gentle and away from the house. Avoid steep slopes where possible.

2. Improve the soil. Hauling in top soil or working in 2 or 3 inches of organic material will help improve most soils. Organic matter should be worked in thoroughly 6 to 10 inches deep.

3. Add lime and fertilizer. The color and vigor of lawns on most coastal soils, and on the more acid soils in the Willamette Valley, are improved by liming. Add ground limestone at 75 to 150 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. Use a complete lawn fertilizer such as 5-3-2, 6-10-4, 10-16-8 or 6-20-0 Broadcast half of the fertilizer before tilling or turning under, save the remainder and work it lightly into the soil surface at seeding time.

4. Install drain tile and sprinkler system, if desired.

5. Level and firm the surface with a roller, a rake and a drag. The soil should be level with the sidewalks, drives, curbs and patios, making the established lawn easier to care for.

### Pre-Watering

6. Keep soil moist for at least 3 to 4 weeks prior to seeding to help settle the soil and insure good weed germination.

7. Work and re-work soil surface lightly to provide a smooth, firm and fine seed-bed and to kill weed seedlings. Do not use weed killers now as they may inhibit grass seed germination later.

8. Fertilize the seedbed. Apply the remaining fertilizer mentioned under step No. 3, and work it in the top 2 inches of soil.

9. Seed the lawn, either by hand or with a fertilizer spreader designed to sow grass seed. Divide the seed in half. Seed the first half one direction and the second half in a direction at right angles to the first. Then rake lightly to mix seed with top one-half inch of soil.

10. Cover seed lightly to keep it moist. A quarter-inch mulch of sawdust, peat moss, straw or lawn clippings will cover exposed seeds and help hold moisture to insure germination. Sprinkle lightly and as often as necessary to keep the soil moist under the mulch.

### Select Seed

Lawn seed should be selected on the following basis: purpose of use of the lawn, type of lawn desired, and characteristics

of the various grasses which meet the needs of the family, and the soil conditions. Grass mixtures which contain quality seeds of recommended grasses are satisfactory, providing a commercial mixture is such that it meets the individual requirements.

Seeding rates are 2 to 3 pounds per 1000 sq. ft. for Bentgrass, 5 to 6 lbs. for fine fescues, and 4 to 5 lbs. for Bluegrasses. When mixing, 1 part of Bentgrass to 4 of fine fescue is desirable.

A good lawn mixture should contain no annual or short-lived perennial varieties. Short-lived grasses common in the poorer lawn mixtures are perennial annual Ryegrass, Redtop, Timothy and Orchard Grass. Bermudagrass, Zoysia, Mondo-grass and Dichondra are not satisfactory for Oregon lawns.

### Water Seeded

After planting, the most important item is keeping the seedbed moist until all seeds are germinated. If the weather turns warm, this may involve light sprinkling several times a day. After the grass reaches several inches high, follow the regular sprinkler irrigation practices for an established lawn.

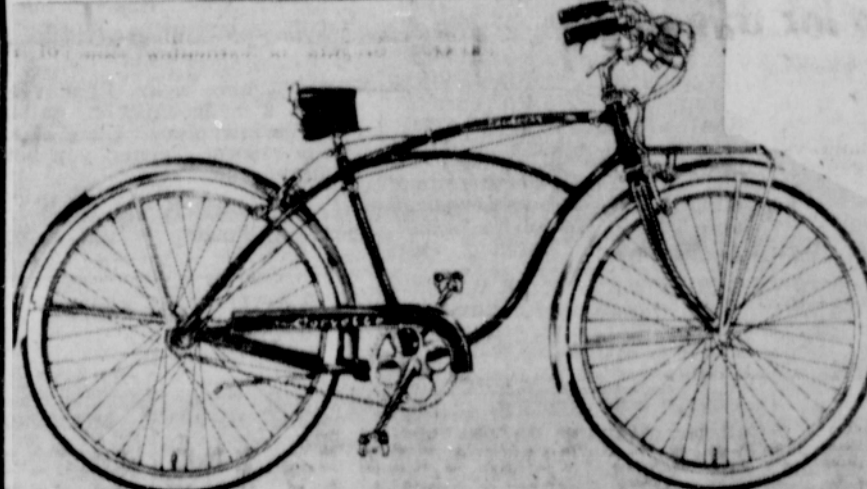
