Hearing Next Month On College Proposal

A hearing on a proposed Clackamas county area education district has been scheduled Tues-day, Jan. 16, at 8 p.m. in the Oregon City high school audi-torium in Oregon City. This moves along plans for a new community college one more step.

A petition bearing the required number of qualified signatures has been filed with the State Board of Education for the formation of the area education district. Boundaries of the proposed district would be "all territory lying within the bound-aries of Clackamas county."

Perry Newport of West Linn is chairman of the county-wide citizens committee which has secured more than 2,400 signa-tures on petitions and about \$2,000 in cash, to meet the state's requirements of citizen interest before the hearing was called off an election date set.

The committee wants to estab-lish an area education district under the new state law permit-ting the establishment of com-munity colleges for two years after high school, with principal financing coming from the state's appropriations.

The union high schools of San-dy, Canby, Milwaukie, Oregon City, Molalla, West Linn and Est-acada, as well as many interest-ed citizens and organizations, have been meeting with the col-lege committee during the past four months.

The Jan. 16 hearing will give an opportunity for more discus-sion on the proposal — both neg-ative and affirmative.
