Admission was \$1 for children under 12, \$2 for adults and those 12 and over, parking ranged from \$1.50 to \$2.50 a day — the farther you were willing to walk to the fair, the lower in price. We were inside at 11:30 a.m. at an initial parking-entrance fee of \$7.50.

We spent nine hours there and had a wheel of a time. Gayway rides were 35 cents and 50 cents, the elevator up the Needle was \$1, the bucket ride was 50 cents one-way and barely enough food to keep a boy going was about \$1.80 — 1/2 small fried chicken, one roll without butter, a dab of coleslaw, milk, and a cone.
