Fair Nears, Crews Busy

The Multnomah County Fair is still five weeks away but already the grounds are being whipped into shape for the big opening Aug. 2.

Lawns on the fairgrounds are being watered, flowers are being transplanted and buildings are being cleaned and painted in preparation for an expected crowd of more than 170,000 over the 10-day period.

The fairgrounds lie in a dormant state throughout the winter months. Paint is allowed to peel and chip off buildings and the race track and no flowers are seen, except near the fairgrounds office where Fair Manager Duane Hennessey works year-round.

Grounds Readied

But when summer comes with its hot weather, the fairgrounds turn into a jumble of activity. Groundskeeper Earl Campbell is already busy planting petunias while taking care of the hanging flower baskets that will soon be placed throughout the fairgrounds.

The inside of one entire building, plus an outside portion alongside, is being landscaped into a Japanese garden, complete with tea house and waterfall. With the doors wide open while the men are working, birds of all kinds fly in and out, settling on the trees and branches set up inside.

Flowers Blooming

Outside, yellow, white and maroon pansies and Japanese-looking shrubs are growing. Pansies may not bloom in Japan but their bright colors look beautiful in the enclosed garden.

In the building where bets are taken while the horses are running, leaves and dust are now on the concrete floor, teller stalls are closed and benches are stacked against the wall.

Between Aug. 2-11, when the fair is in full swing, this area will be cleaned out and swarming with people eager to bet their money on their favorite horse, waiting impatiently for their turn at the teller's windows.

Paint on the wire and wood fences around the race track is peeling off but Fair Manager Hennessey says he will wait until the last minute before ordering them repainted. "This is to guard against a last-minute rainstorm which would muddy up the new paint job," he said.

Livestock Featured

Livestock has always been a main feature of the fair and this year will be no exception. Prize dairy goats, poultry, rabbits, Shetland ponies, sheep, beef and dairy cattle, plus race horses, will be on display throughout the 10-day run of the fair.

The greater portion of the livestock barns will not be repainted, because of lack of funds. But the one that is being redecorated — and that really is the proper word — is being fixed up in a big way.

The goat barn and judging pavilion gets the face lifting — and quite a face lifting it is! The goats will have their tired nerves soothed by a pale blue ceiling, soft yellow walls, light green pens and rose beige stands (for the spectators, not the goats).

No, fair officials are not planning to pipe in soft music to the goats at milking time.

Olallie Lake Resort Opens

Officials of the Lakes Ranger District, Mt. Hood National Forest, announced today that the fishing resort at Olallie Lake opened for the season on June 23.

The resort has been operated at Olallie Lake for the past 22 years by Mr. George Upton of Forest Grove. This popular recreation facility offers good fishing and overnight accommodations. Boat rentals are available.

As the snow continues to melt, excellent hiking to nearby scenic lakes and vistas will be provided by the many Forest Service trails in the area. Forest crews will be working on these trails early in July, it is hoped.

All of the Lakes District picnic and camping areas, with the exception of those south of Olallie Lake are now open. The road to Breitenbush Lake is still closed by snow.
