

Council, Mayor Invite Extra Criticism

Sandy's city council and mayor were bound to make someone unhappy in the decision on whether to ask the state for a new highway on the existing route, or on a one-way couplet on Main and Proctor avenues.

However, the council brought itself more ill will in the manner of deciding. A public hearing was supposed to be climaxed by a vote, but the vote was stalled until this week's council meeting.

Many citizens will squawk, rightly or not, that the delay was to allow an absent "present route" supporter to count his vote at the later meeting. Others complain that the hearing was supposed to see all evidence presented, but that

the delay allowed more comment at the council meeting that should have been consummated during the hearing.

Both sides of the issue have strong supporting arguments. Though leaning toward the existing route prior to the hearing, we believe the hearing strengthened the case for a one-way couplet. The five-lane "solution" by the city council apparently wipes out much of the advantage for highway business since no street parking would be allowed.

We doubt that this is the best solution, and we also doubt that the state will accept this plan, since the choice was supposedly left to the city between a four-lane highway on the present route, or a one-way system.
