Steelhead, Salmon Make High Runs

Record runs of Steelhead and Silver salmon ascended the extensive Portland General Electric Co. fishways around dams on the Clackamas river during 1962, according to the company's chief biologist George J. Elcher.

The largest migration in modern times of Silver salmon up the Clackamas is still being counted and will continue past PGE's North Fork dam through late February. The run already exceeds 2,800 fish, compared to the 1961-62 total of 2,189.

John Dudley Duffy, 64, who with his wife operated "Dutch and John's Restaurant" near Orient until recently, died suddenly at his home last Friday.

A Gresham area resident for 33 years, he had retired when he and his wife sold the popular eating place not long ago.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Carroll funeral home, with vault interment at Willamette National Cemetery.

Mr. Duffy was born in Denver, Colo., on Jan. 14, 1899, and spent his boyhood in Colorado. He later lived in California and Nevada before coming to the Gresham area in 1930. The couple's home is on Dodge Park Road, east of Gresham.

During World War II he served as a cook with the Navy Seabees.

He belonged to Portland Elks Lodge No. 142, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Gresham American Legion post. An avid fisherman, he knew most Oregon fishing areas as well as he did the Gresham area. He often talked of fishing with the customers at the restaurant, many of the customers became good friends of the couple.

Katherine, Mr. Duffy's wife of 34 years, survives.

But a court action to change your name puts the public officially on notice that you have a new one, and it saves you endless trouble in collecting debts, identifying yourself, getting credit, inheriting property, selling your home, getting insurance, Social Security benefits, etc.

Some people change their names too much for their own good by using nicknames, middle names, and various ways of spelling the same name. It may cost real money to prove that John Jacob Smith is the same as Jack Smith, Jake Smith, J. Smith or J. Jake Smythe.

Decide on a good name to put on legal papers, checks, contracts, auto licenses. Stick with it unless you have good reason to change it.

In 1913 he moved to Bend and practiced law. He was Deschutes County district attorney for 18 years and was well known and loved in central Oregon. He enjoyed hunting and fishing until late in life.

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
