perished, and the remains were found under the building.

Named Winner

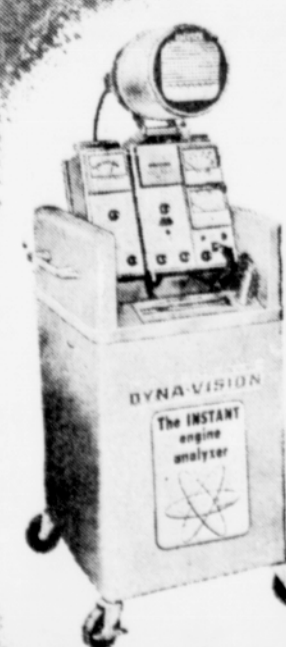
Doris Arlene Bishop is winner from Sandy high school in the 1963 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She thus becomes eligible for one of 102 scholarships with a total value of \$110,000.

Having scored first in her school in the knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior girls Dec. 4, the winner's paper has been entered in competition with those of other state high school winners for state-wide honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named in the spring. She will receive a \$1500 scholarship from General Mills, sponsor of the program. A \$500 award will be made to the second highest ranking Homemaker of Tomorrow in the state. The school of each state winner will receive a set of Encyclopedia Britannica.

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
