Firm Options Land, Zone Changed Asked

The most recent development on the proposed Mt. Resurrection Retirement Village is the option said to have been taken by Commonwealth, Inc., on the property where the retirement homes would be built. This information, said John Mills, was given him by Herbert Jackson of Commonwealth. He added that there had, to his knowledge, been no other definite developments on this project.

Mills, who is liaison man between the Sandy chamber of commerce and the city council and planning commission, told the chamber Tuesday that W. R. Beecher has requested a zone change, from C-1 to C-2, for a piece of property he owns between Proctor Ave. and Main street. The zone change is being requested in order that a super service station, said to be a \$37,500 project, may be constructed on the property.

The request will be taken up at the Wednesday, Feb. 6, planning commission meeting, Mills said.

He reported further that he had brought the chamber's recommendation for a business

tax before the city council, but the council is definitely opposed to the tax unless it will include everyone doing business in Sandy, including bona fide wholesalers who deliver to stores in Sandy. "They feel it should be an 'all or nothing at all' thing," Mills told the chamber. "I don't think you will ever interest them in it on any other basis."

Jerry Swails said he thinks something should definitely be done to get the business tax put through right away.
