Lolo Pass Road Regrading Told

Lolo Pass road needs 30 thousand yards of gravel, Clackamas county engineer and surveyor John H. Keeley Jr., told the Sandy Chamber of Commerce. He said the county hopes to start graveling next summer.

The county needs gravel, he said, explaining that they have a rock crusher and a quarry. "Right now we have everything but rock," he said.

He told chamber members that the Forest Service has asked the county not to crush rock at the quarry site because of fire hazard. Hauling rock from the quarry to the crusher makes it an expensive operation.

John Mills offered to give the county all the rock it could use, but Mills has solid hard rock and Keeley said the "cotype hole" type of blasting required for Mills' rock was not feasible for an amount as small as that needed for the Lolo Pass job. It is a cheaper method of obtaining gravel when large quantities are needed, he said. Keeley added that the county has condemned the property where the present Lolo Pass road exists. It will be finished in approximately the same place, but widened and reggraded.

Concerning the road to be built by-passing Welches, Keeley said the Forest Service will start on this project after they acquire right-of-way.
