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Sandy Makes Super Score In 82-38 Win Over Foxes

A fired-up team of Sandy hoopers defeated the Silverton Silver Foxes by a margin which is possibly the largest in SUHS history last Friday at Silverton.

When all the scoring was over, Sandy was on the good end of a remarkable 82-38 verdict. The game wasn't a case of one Sandyite piling up a high personal score, for the team put on a show of well balanced scoring with four players hitting double figures. Neither was it a case of five towering Pioneers overwhelming a less experienced team, since the reserves saw plenty of action.

Sandy's Dan Nichols started things off with two fast jump shots to put the Pioneers ahead 4-0. Silverton's Reider sank a shot then to put the hosts on the scoreboard. Carl Sandstrom, easily the tallest man on the floor, put in a lay-in, and Gerald Hale put in a free throw.

Wade Scott followed with two free throws, and that proved to be the final Silverton score of the quarter. Sandy shooters racked up 18 straight points while the hosts could not make another dent. Nichols hit another jump-shot, Hale, Chuck Croston and C. Sandstrom hit consecutive lay-ins, and Hale hit a long jumper. In the closing minute, Croston sank a long set shot, Nichols added a fourth field goal, Dale Carpenter scored on a tip-in, and Hale hit another short jump shot.

Foxes Come Up

The Foxes, behind 25-4, had more than a little reason to be discouraged. Their second quarter showing, however, wasn't as bad. C. Sandstrom hit a short jump shot and two free throws, but Silverton started to slow down the trend at this point. They got five straight points on a lay-in, a tip-in and a free throw. Pioneer guard Ken Naas hit a jump shot, but Silverton's

Scott came back with another couple of free throws. Naas sank another shot, Alan Fleischman hit a jumper, and Carpenter tipped one in with three seconds left in the half.

Leading 37-11, Sandy came back with another 25-point quarter. Silverton's Terry Larson opened scoring with a lay-in and free throw, but Sandy took over again at that point. A tip-in by C. Sandstrom, Croston's long jumper and Hale's lay-in pushed the score to 43-14. Larson then put together another lay-in and free throw combination.

Big Carl put in another lay-in, but Larson countered with a hook shot. The Pioneers started to make their presence felt again as Nichols and Jon Sandstrom sank gift tosses. Hale drove again for two, and Nichols hit another of his jump shots. After Carpenter dropped in a free throw, Bill Gragg scored a field goal and free cast for the Silver Foxes.

Carpenter and Hale penetrated the zone defense for two more lay-ins, and Russ Dobson broke his own scoring ice for the year on a jump shot. Reider sank a long set shot for Silverton, but Nichols came back with two fast field goals. Reider scored again on a long shot to close the quarter. The third period had been the host's best as they came through for 17 markers.

Fox Guard Opens

Reider, the red-headed guard, opened the final stanza with another shot from the field, but the strong Pioneers came back for six points before the quarter was two minutes old. Naas made another long jumper, J.

Sandstrom dribbled for a lay-in, and Croston sank two free throws after having some trouble with a contact lens. Jim Reed and Crag Needles boosted the Fox total four points and Dana Bartley and Dan Nichols answered with a throw from the line and a field goal.

A Carpenter lay-in was sandwiched between two Silverton free throws, and the Pioneers took over again. Eyeing the 80-point mark, the team dominated the closing minutes. Carpenter added a charity throw to the visitors' bulging total, and former "B" squad player Mike Motejl hit a jump shot. Then Carpenter hit two more lay-ins, ten seconds apart, the last of which made the total 80.

With 1:06 left in the run-away game, Red sank the last Silverton score of the game on two strikes from the line. Carl Sandstrom put the icing on the cake and said a hearty "good-bye" to the Silverton Silver Foxes by laying in another shot for two points.

Sandy's field percentage was hardly the best of the season. They made 36 shots out of 79 for 45.6%.

Nichols led scoring efforts with 17, Carpenter and C. Sandstrom scored 14 each, and Gerald Hale popped in 13 to headline the astounding display of scoring. Croston and Naas scored eight and six, and J. Sandstrom added three. Fleischman, Dobson and Motejl each donated two to the cause, and Bartley hit one.

Larson and Reider led Silverton with 11 and 10.

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What's Cooking?

Today I would like to share with you my most asked for recipe. It was given to me by a friend in Portland about 14 years ago when I was just a bride and totally unaccustomed to making yeast bread. It is an easy recipe and ideal for the working girl or the busy mother because it can be mixed at one time and stored in the refrigerator until about two hours before baking time. It keeps well in the refrigerator for up to three days.

This column is dedicated to Mr. and Mrs. Norman P. Allen of Portland. When they come for dinner at our house Norm threatens to go home if I don't have hot rolls and cinnamon rolls.

Refrigerator Light Bread Rolls
2 cups milk
1/2 cup sugar
3 Tablespoons shortening
2 Teaspoons salt
2 cakes compressed yeast or 2 pkgs. dry yeast
1/4 cup lukewarm water
1 Teaspoon sugar
2 Eggs
7 Cups flour (sifted)
Scald milk and combine with sugar, salt and shortening. Cool until lukewarm. Meanwhile soften the yeast in 1/4 cup lukewarm water. Add 1 teaspoon sugar and stir into lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten eggs and stir in 4 cups bread flour. Beat well; add 3 more cups bread flour and as much more as can be stirred into the dough without having to knead or

work in the flour. (I find that 7 cups are sufficient here in the West where we have hard wheat flour but in the South where we have soft wheat flour I have to use more.) At this point the surface of the dough may be greased, the dough placed in a large bowl or pan which can be tightly covered and stored in refrigerator. Allow them to raise in the refrigerator at least four hours before using. I usually make them in the morning when I wish to use them at night or make them a day ahead. They should be removed from the refrigerator 1 1/2 to 2 hours before serving time. Punch the dough down and knead it a little. Allow the dough to rest five minutes or more and then shape into your favorite kind of roll. I usually grease muffin tins and place three rolls of dough about one inch thick (depending on the size of your tins) in each tin to make cloverleaf rolls. You might prefer pocketbook rolls, butter flake, or cinnamon rolls.

For cinnamon rolls I take and roll it out to about three-fourths inch thick. Spread softened butter or margarine over it, then cover with light brown sugar. Sprinkle over this about one-half cup of raisins which have been soaked for a short time in hot water to puff them and make them moist. Then sprinkle with cinnamon. Roll the dough and crimp the edges to seal. Cut the circle of dough with a sharp knife into three-fourths inch rolls. Place into a pan which has been prepared with a generous amount of butter over which you sprinkle brown sugar. Cover prepared rolls with a thin dish towel and set in a warm place and allow to rise to double in bulk. This usually takes about an hour. Do not allow any drafts in a room where rolls are raising.

(The children's favorite at our house is honey rolls. To make these I cut the dough which has been rolled to three-eighths inch thickness into strips one inch wide and about eight inches long. Then I twist and circle the strip into a round shape and place into a buttered pan. Use a teaspoon and cover with honey topping. If there is honey topping left save it and put it over the rolls when they come out of the oven.

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
