Many of Butch's experiences will make up the day's activities for the class. Beginning at 10 a.m. when the juniors arrive, each one will have to pass through customs, undergoing the regular inspection of all immigrants. During the day Italian games will be played including Italian-style football where no hands ever come in contact with the ball.

Howard Berger, executive vice president of the Clackamas County Bank, talked this past week on "The Bank's Role in the Community."

This year banks are celebrating the centennial of the dual banking system, and the Clackamas County Bank is also celebrating its 52nd year of business, and Berger's talk was in conjunction with these events.

One hundred years ago, Feb. 25, 1863, President Lincoln signed the bill called "The National Security Act," which was important for two reasons: 1. It established a national paper currency backed by the U.S. Treasury.

2. It authorized the creation of a national banking system to operate alongside the state banking system.

Berger stated that today 14 1/2 billion checks per day go through the banks and we think nothing of it "unless one of our own bounces." We think nothing of using the same currency in Oregon as in New York.

This was not always so. In 1800 there were 20 states and 28 banks and a little over 5 million people. All of the banks were state banks and under individual state laws. They issued their own currency and it was not readily accepted in other parts of the country. Counterfeiting was rampant and bankers had little or no training.

The National Currency Act provided for a national currency and a system of national banks. It was a reform in banking because it provided a system of chartering and supervising new banks. Fifty years later the Federal Reserve System was established to regulate the supply of money and credit. The Federal Reserve Bank is a banker's bank, where banks discount paper for cash so they can continue to loan money. In 1933 the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was established to provide insurance on deposits up to \$10,000.

"Banking had its growing pains like any other business, but no community can operate satisfactorily without a bank. The Clackamas County Bank reached five million in deposits on Oct. 30 of 1962. Their loans have doubled in the past five years. The desire of our bank is to continue to serve you well."

Tuesday at 10 a.m. the missionary society will meet at the church to engage in a prayer program under the direction of Mrs. Don Castle.

Wednesday evening the prayer program material will be presented through pantomime, tape recording and choral readings. The Thursday morning meeting will be concluded with lunch at the church.

Sunday evening, March 10, there will be a special program "Opening Doors," with program participants entering large doors erected on the platform. Speakers will describe the home mission work among the illiterates, the Division of Chaplaincy and the ministry to stop the spread of communism in America.

Each meeting is planned to inform Southern Baptists of the work being done by their denomination, to present further needs, to engage in prayer about them, to receive an offering for the needs and ministries and to offer an opportunity for personal commitment to the work of home missions.

An offering goal of \$100 has been set by First Baptist church. This will be the largest single offering ever given by the church for missions. The week is sponsored by the Woman's Missionary society and is participated in by all members of the church.
