The annual invasion of weeds in the lawn is beginning now, and one of our most prevalent lawn weed problems is a dainty little plant with a geranium-shaped leaf in miniature, called Speedwell or Veronica. This can be an extremely invasive weed in our lawns, and given time could completely crowd out the grass.

Several materials are on our local market for use against this weed problem. Use either Endothal or a 2,4-D, 3,4-5T mixture. Follow the directions on the manufacturer's label.

With the beginning of new shoot growth on many of our shade trees, disease problems will become more prevalent during the next month-and-a-half. Some of the specific shade tree disease problems will be Sycamore Leaf and Twig Blight causing leaves to turn brown and die as they emerge from the buds.

Another shade tree disease is Willow Twig Blight, in which brownish spots develop along the midribs of the leaves, causing them to become scorched, withered and drop.

Both of these shade tree disease problems can be controlled with the timely use of fixed copper fungicide, used according to manufacturer's directions. The local farm and garden stores and nursery outlets have copper fungicides available for your use.

There is still time to transplant iris if you have some that need to be moved before summer comes. When dividing and transplanting, make sure each root piece has at least one good bud, and move as much of the root system as you possibly can with the root piece.

Daphne shrubs were badly injured by winter storms this past winter in many areas. This injury shows itself as a blackening of the leaves, withering, and sometimes complete defoliation of the plant.

Some selective pruning would be advisable after the shrubs bloom, in order to remove some of the injured plant tissue. Cut back to good, healthy buds to stimulate new growth this summer.

Raspberries and blackberries in the home garden can be pruned and tied up now. Remove old canes to the ground, and top back any canes that are too tall. If you have gooseberries, remember that they bear on old wood, so prune carefully and remove only diseased, injured or dead wood.

Keep a sharp eye on your small greenhouse now. With the sun heat becoming a little bit more intense and the days getting somewhat longer, the temperature should be watched very closely in the greenhouse.
