Mills Listed For Blowdown

Clackamas county farm woodland owners who still have downed timber from the disastrous Columbus Day storm, might well consider having it salvaged with portable sawmills. Charles Ladd, chief farm forester for the State Forestry Department pointed out.

The sooner this timber is salvaged the more it will be to the owners financial advantage, due to possible market fluctuations, he said.

Besides this consideration, many of the farmers in the blowdown area lost sheds and barns, or at least suffered some degree of damage to such structures, he added. This created a need for lumber with which to perform the repair or replacement work.

He said that portable plants offer a convenient and practical means of doing this type of milling. A list which he has prepared contains the names of 58 portable mills. These are located in the Willamette Valley counties.

In addition to the movable type, there are local stationary mills that will saw on a custom basis for the farmers, if the logs are brought in, he said.

What's Cooking?

Summer meal planning calls for special dishes to tempt palates in hot weather.

From the files of Mrs. Roy Williams of Anniston, Ala. comes

Angel Biscuits

1 pkg compressed yeast
2 tbs lukewarm water
¼ t baking soda
2 tbs sugar
¼ c shortening
¾ c buttermilk

Method: Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water, let stand 5 minutes. Stir flour, baking soda and sugar together; add shortening and cut in with pastry blender. Add yeast to buttermilk; add to flour mixture slowly, stirring it in with a fork. Turn dough out on a lightly floured cloth or board; knead several times. Roll out ½ inch thick, cut and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 450 degrees oven 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 12 to 16 biscuits.

Molded Ambrosia

1 cup crushed pineapple
1 pkg. orange gelatin
1/3 cup sugar
1 cup hot water
1 cup dairy sour cream
¼ tsp. vanilla
1 cup orange sections (mandarine)

Drain pineapple & reserve syrup. Dissolve gelatin and sugar in hot water, stir in reserve syrup, chill until partially set. Add sour cream and vanilla. Whip till fluffy, fold in pineapple, oranges and pour into mold and chill until set. Cut in squares, trim with marchino cherries.

Salad Sophia

1½ pkg. lemon jello
1 cup hot water
1 pint orange sherbet

1 cup miniature marshmallows
1 cup mandarin oranges
½ cup chopped walnuts.
Have everything ready for salad as the sherbert makes this thicken quite rapidly. Freeze.

Hot Crab Souffle

8 slices bread
2 cups crab
½ cup chopped walnuts.
1 cup mayonnaise
1 small onion (chopped)
1 small green pepper (chopped)

1 cup celery (diced)
3 cup milk
4 well-beaten eggs
1 can mushroom soup
½ cup grated cheese—cracker barrel medium cheese.

Dice half of bread into baking dish. Mix crab, mayonnaise, onion, green pepper and celery and spread over diced bread. Trim crusts from remaining 4 slices and place trimmed slices over crab mixture. Mix eggs and milk together and pour over the mixture. Place in refrigerator over night. Bake in 325 degree oven for 15 minutes. Take from oven and spoon soup over the top, top with cheese and paprika and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

Potato Chip Cookies

Cream:
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white sugar
1 cup shortening (part butter)

Add and beat in 2 beaten eggs
1 tsp vanilla
Sift and mix 2 cup flour, 1 tsp soda, ½ tsp. salt
Add 1 cup potato chips, 1 cup oatmeal (quick cooking), and 1 cup walnuts, chopped.
1-6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips
Bake at 375 degrees for 12-15 minutes.
