

RECREATION

Barlow District

Roads open to White River road to White river; Dufur Mill road still impassable due to construction; North - South road open full length; Jordan creek road open full length. Trails open but none maintained.

Campgrounds open to Rock creek, Bonney Crossing, Little Badger, Forest Camp, Post Camp and 8 - Mile Camp via Brooks Meadows Rd. and Pleasant Ridge.

Fishing at Rock creek and Tygh creek—fair.

Fire Danger, moderate.

Bear Springs District

Roads all open with the exception of the Mt. Wilson road. Trails open but none maintained.

All campgrounds open except Jackpot meadows and Frying Pan lake.

Fishing has been excellent at Clear lake and Timothy lake.

Fire Danger, woods are dry and fire danger increasing.

Special Items: Eastgate Rd. has logging activity; motorists may have to wait for short intervals to get through. Ticks increasing in numbers. Recreationists should check themselves when coming out of the woods.

Columbia Gorge District

Roads all open including Larch Mt.

Eagle creek trail open for four miles (windfall beyond). Multnomah falls trail to Wahkeena falls, Larch Mtn. trail to Multnomah basin, Oneonta trail to Franklin Ridge open to four and one half miles, Herman creek trail open to four mile camp.

Campgrounds open are Overlook picnic area, Wahkeena falls, Eagle creek and Multnomah falls.

Fishing has been good at Eagle creek, Oneonta creek and Herman creek.

Fire danger is moderately high due to strong winds over the Gorge area. Fire caution should be taken.

Special Items: The Tanner Creek Rd. (previously under Bonneville Power's jurisdiction), will now be under the jurisdiction of the Forest Service. The Ranger requests that no one use this road until the crews can get in and maintain the road. It should be open by July 1.

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Collawash District
Roads open to travel up to 4000 feet and above where cleared. Upper Collawash road is rough. Bagby road good condition up to last 1 1/2 miles, but easily passable.

Trails are not cleared of logs, but free of snow up to 4000 feet and in exposed areas up to 5000 feet.

All campgrounds open. Large numbers of fishermen, few fish!

Fire Danger, drying trend raised local hazard considerably. Rain and low clouds have abated this somewhat but further drying trend expected. Take caution.

Special Items: Beware of logging trucks throughout district.

Lakes District

Roads open to Skyline and Olallie lake. Rough but passable. Shellrock open to Abbot junction only. Pinhead to Skyline Rd., Midway lake road open — has been plowed but is rough. Anvil creek road open.

Trails open but none maintained.

All campgrounds open.

Fire danger is a drying trend. Take caution with campfires.

Special Items: Still snow drifts present at Olallie lake. The lake is still partially frozen over. Rhododendrons in bloom below 2500 feet. Dogwoods in bloom below 4200 feet.

Estacada District

All roads free of snow below 3500 feet. Most roads rough and some closed by obstructions. Ladue Rd. being reconstructed.

Trails open but none maintained.

Campgrounds open all below 4000 feet. Big Eddy is closed.

Fishing is fair.

Fire danger is increasing. . . take caution with fire.

Special Items: Logging traffic on most of district. . . caution should be taken.

Hood River District

Roads open to Mt. Hood Loop is slow and bumpy going through new construction. Lolo Pass road is free of snow but not yet maintained. All roads open to Los lake. Wahtum lake road clear to Wahtum lake. Cloud Cap road is still blocked by snow.

Most trails, except those on the mountain are free of snow. None have been maintained.

Campgrounds open are Lost Lake Resort and part of the campground. Most of Lost lake campground closed due to construction. Wahtum lake, Rainy lake, Sherwood, Robinhood and Ladd creek campgrounds are open. Ladd creek and the East Fork Camp's water systems are not working as yet.

Fishing at Lost lake has been stocked recently. . . good fishing expected. Kingsley Reservoir has been off and on. Fish are there but not biting. East Fork should be good from Robinhood down to the construction area and from Polallie creek to the county rock crusher.

Zigzag District

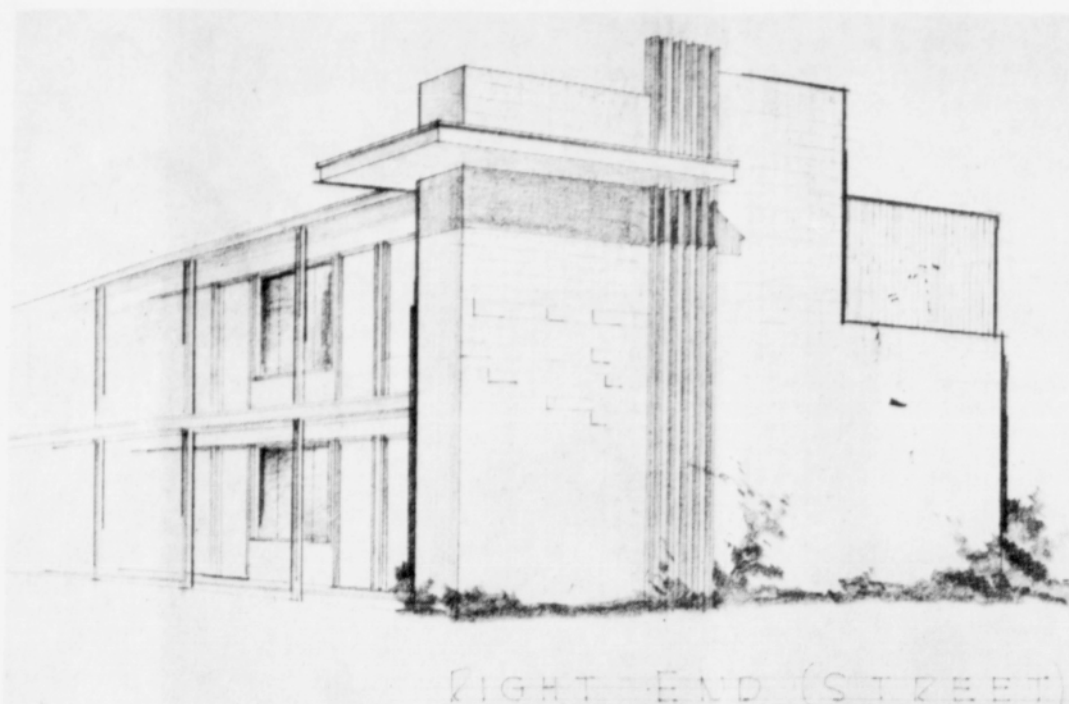
All State Highways, including 35 to Hood River, open. Forest Service roads still unworked. Still creek and Mud creek road open. Lolo Pass open to Lost lake.

Trails open are Mirror lake and Salmon River trail.

Campgrounds open are all below 4000 feet.

Fishing is fair along Salmon river. . . high lakes should be good this weekend.

Fire Danger is high.

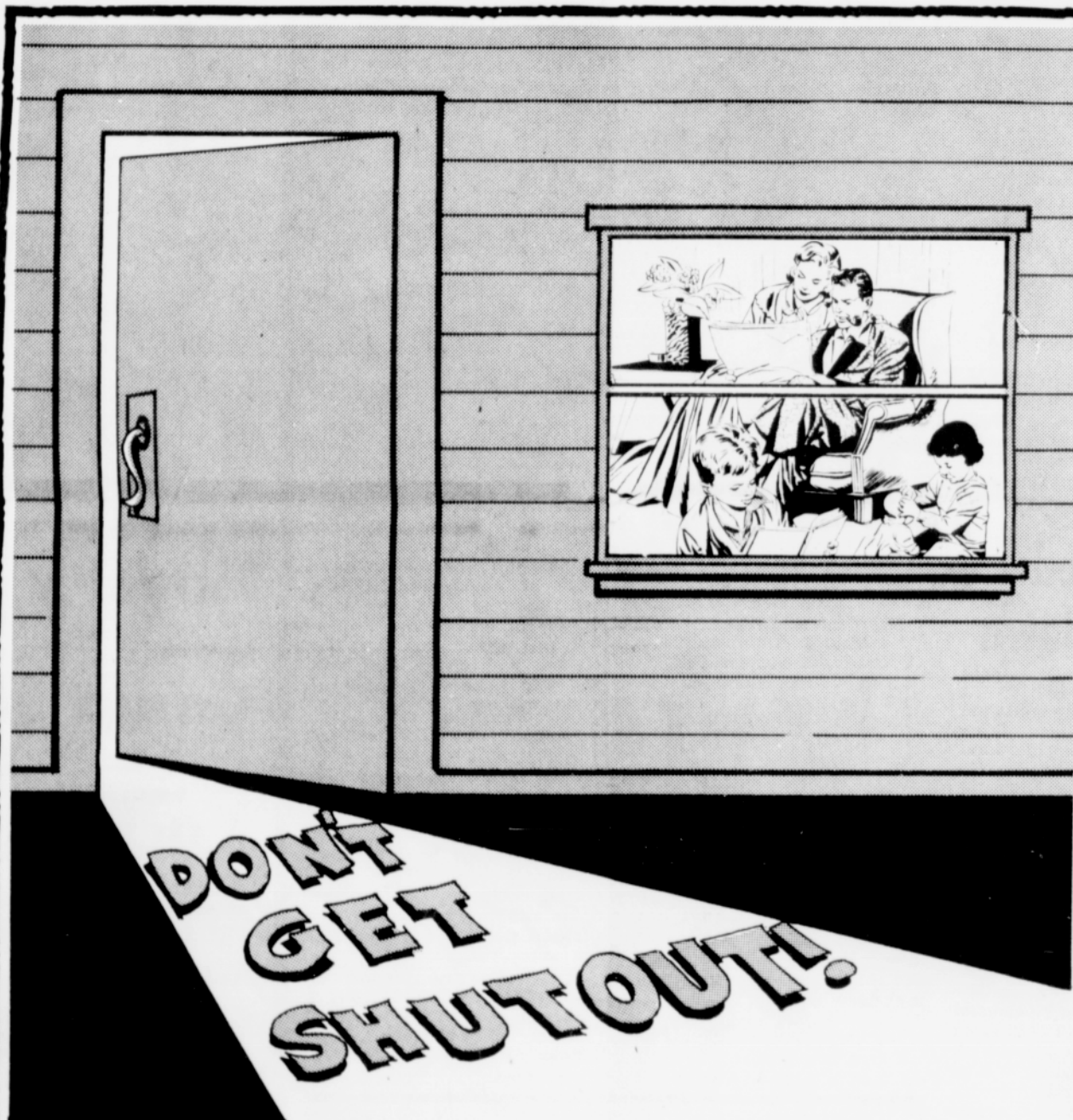
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
