Zone Change Hearing Set

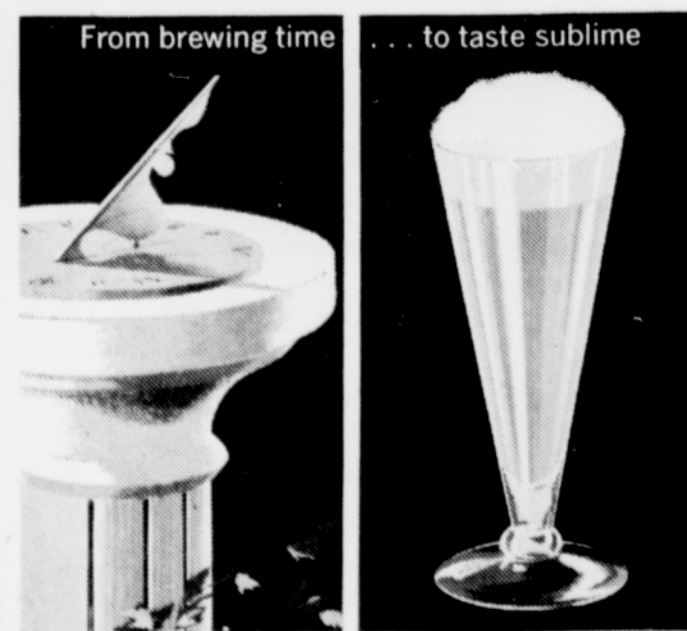
New Owners Plan 'Cleaning Club'
