Water Pressure Need Is Cited by Nursing Home

Lack of sufficient water pressure on Hospital Hill to properly activate the fire sprinkler system at the nursing home was the subject of a letter read at last Monday's city council meeting. The letter, which was written to the city by Rev. Rene Bozarth on June 12, caused much indignation among council members, who say they are doing everything possible to remedy the situation.

Rev. Bozarth points out that the nursing home insurance rating, recently made, figured the expensive sprinkling system of no worth without adequate water pressure, costing the home an increase of \$700 in insurance premiums over the next two-year period.

Rev. Bozarth also said he felt he should have been extended the courtesy of answer to his letter and some information on what the city was doing to correct the situation.

His letter follows:
The Honorable Mayor
The City of Sandy, Oregon
City Hall

Dear Sir:
I am appalled, dismayed, irritated, and somewhat frightened to have been informed this morning that water pressure serving St. Jude's Home in Sandy is so inadequate as to be slightly less than 25 per cent of its needed pressure in order to properly activate and maintain the fire sprinkler system installed at a cost in excess of \$7,000 for St. Jude's Home in Sandy.

I am sure that you and the members of the City Council will recognize that in the care of helpless geriatrics patients, most of whom are confined to bed, one of our chief worries and interests is adequate fire protection. Over the country in the past five year period there have been a series of disastrous and tragic nursing home fires in which helpless, elderly patients lost their lives. One of the most dramatic of these occurred in the state of Illinois about two years ago.

Fire Feared
You will recognize with what fear the Episcopal church as an operator of a nursing home in your city views the possibility of fire, especially since Sandy is so small and so isolated as to warrant only the services of an excellent volunteer fire department.

Because we recognized the implicit problem the church required the contractor and the architect of our building on Scenic St. to install the finest possible sprinkling equipment. The best equipment in the world is a mockery however if the City of Sandy is not able to supply us with adequate water pressure.

We have come to this area with an investment in excess of half a million dollars and with a payroll each month in excess of \$4,000 and with no particular return to us from the City of Sandy for the business.

We do here nor for the jobs we create, nor for the large number of persons we bring into this city to visit at St. Jude's, nor for the prestige we give you, nor for the fact that where for 14 years you had an ugly shell you now have a beautiful structure — and we have done this without, I think, adequate cooperation from the city at any particular point.

While we are reluctant to engage in tension or hostility causing situations we nevertheless feel it necessary to come down very heavily in our demand privately to you and to the council and later if need be publicly in our demand through the whole community that the problem of water pressure on Hospital Hill be solved immediately for the sake of the innocent lives which are now involved.

I shall appreciate your serious consideration to the content of this letter at a meeting of the council of the City of Sandy and I shall appreciate your written reply. With every our desire to be of help to the city administration in any possible way I am,

COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Mrs. Kenny from Boring called our attention to a malformation in some Red Clover plants on her place recently. There was a noticeable drooping of the flower heads and a die back of the stalks.

Also, there was a very evident splitting of the leaves which appeared abnormal after theorizing about hormone spray, boron use, etc., it finally took our pathologist, Bob Powelson at OSU, to come up with the answer.

The culprit (which incidentally hardly ever attacks Red Clover) turned out to be a fungus called Northern Anthracnose. It may overwinter on crop residue or be carried by the seed and is favored by the cool wet spring such as we had. Crimson Clover is especially susceptible.

Control of this fungus can be obtained by use of clean certified seed, rotation, and treating the seed with fungicide before planting.
