## Business Tax Seen For 1964

An inquiry by Chamber of Commerce members into developmental progress of the proposed business tax reveals that its passage had been stalled by a phrase written into it which exempts those selling agricultural products from paying the tax.

John Mills said he had made a strong objection to this, as he felt it unfair to Sandy merchants who sold such products. He feels most councilmen now agree with him and predicts passage of the business tax some time during the fall of 1963, with the effective date probably set for Jan. 1, 1964.

## What's Cooking?

**Mayonnaise Chocolate Cake**  
Put into sifter: 2 cups sifted flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons soda, 4 tablespoons cocoa.  
Sift into bowl and stir in 1 cup water, 1 cup real mayonnaise and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Bake in greased and floured 8 in. x 8 in. x 2 in. or 9 in. x 9 in. x 2 in. pan in a 350 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes.

### FROSTING

1/4 cup brown sugar  
1/4 cube butter or margarine  
3 tablespoons cream or milk  
Melt together over low heat. Sift in 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar and stir until of spreading consistency. Add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and 1/3 cup chopped nuts.

## Civil Rights Issue Affects Us All

After a month-long trip which took this writer into some 31 states, we've concluded:

(a) We here on the West Coast don't have much of a concept of the civil rights problem.

(b) But we will soon. Everywhere in the Middle West and East—Chicago, Detroit, New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Baltimore—civil rights are the No. 1 story. The tension is obvious everywhere.

The problem isn't confined to the South. Actually, we saw far more Negroes in Chicago and New York City than we did anywhere in the South. Chicago, for instance, has some 800,000 Negroes; 40 per cent of them on relief.

This last statistic is the crucial one in that it points at the key problem . . . jobs. Even Negro leaders concede that if there was work for everyone, there would be few demonstrations.

## Hatfield's Status May Be Changing

How does the maneuvering for the Republican presidential nomination affect Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield, a likely candidate for vice-president?

Ask a lot of different people and you get a lot of different answers.

Some people in the East feel that Hatfield is closely tied to Gov. Rockefeller and if the latter, indeed, is out of the running, Hatfield won't figure either.

But a large percentage of Negroes are not well educated, can find few opportunities in the job market.

The Administrator's civil rights program aims to assure Negroes of equal opportunities. But all the laws in the world won't provide employment for an uneducated, ill-trained person. This takes time.

And how will this affect us here on the West Coast where few racial strains are evident? One place is housing; another is in job opportunities. The impact of civil rights legislation will be nationwide.

What will be the exact form of civil rights legislation? Persons to whom we talked felt it wouldn't be in exactly the form the administration requested. But most of the key provisions will be retained.

Southern opposition, much of it undoubtedly sincere, will only slow the timetable. The die has been cast.

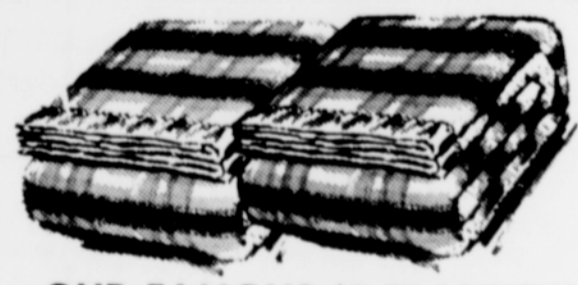

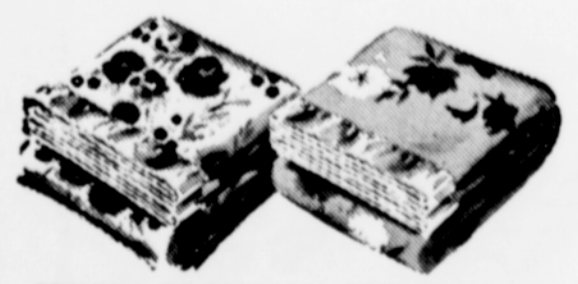

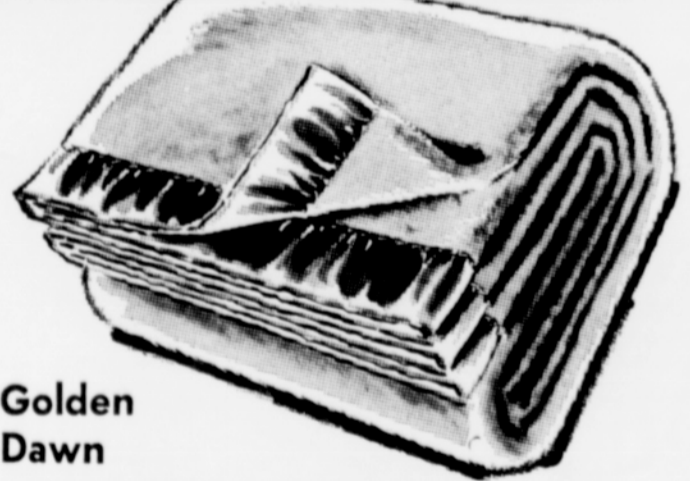
