Mt. Hood Committee Plans Safety Fair

Members of the Mt. Hood Safety Committee met at the Dew Drop Inn at Sandy for a special meeting to lay plans for a Community Safety Fair, tentatively scheduled for early in December.

The conference will be under the sponsorship of the Mt. Hood Safety Committee, in cooperation with the State Industrial Accident Commission. Actively participating and assisting in the preparation are the Sandy Lions Club, the Mt. Hood Lions Club, and other interested local organizations.

A steering committee, consisting of L. C. Ten Eyck, Duane Knapp, Morris Scholten, Milton Fox, Tom Day, L. J. McDermed, Ronald Krebs, and Victor Spaller, representing local organizations and industry met with SIAC Safety Representative Ed Kubin, and C. B. Huskey, W. G. Thorsell, and L. S. Penkava of the Commission's Salem office to develop preliminary conference plans.

Tentative topics selected for presentation were demonstrations involving first aid, electrical safety, model steel spar tree, fire protection, traffic safety, safe welding methods, home safety, tractor safety, and sawmill safety.

The next planning meeting is scheduled as a no-host dinner at the Dew Drop Inn at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 6. All persons interested in furthering the cause of safety are urged to attend and offer suggestions.

RECREATION

Roads

Districts report all roads on the forest are open but work remains to be done on some of them. Columbia Gorge district reports the road from Hood River to Kingsley and on to Rainy lake and Wahtum lake is extremely hazardous to low clearance motor vehicles. Best roads leading to this area are through Hood River and Dee. There is logging equipment on this route.

The Abbott and Frazier Fork roads are still in very poor condition and caution is advised. Heavy equipment remains on Collawash River Rd., 2 miles from the Two Rivers junction. One way traffic — extreme caution advised. Heavy truck traffic on all roads throughout district.

The Skyline Rd. (entire length) is being graded now and the road should be in good condition for fishermen by next weekend.

Campgrounds

All campgrounds are open. Lakes ranger district reports that Peninsula campground at the lower end of Olallie lake has not been officially opened but the public is welcome and encouraged to make use of it. However, the district reports that the road into the campground has not been rocked and in wet weather the road is very bad. The camp is complete in every other respect, including well water.

Last lake campground is closed during the week due to construction. The resort will remain open for business and the public is welcome to walk-in-fish during the week. It will be open for camping on weekends only until the latter part of August.

Ranger Don Smith of the Columbia Gorge district reports that the Overlook picnic area has just been opened for use. It is located three miles west of Cascade Locks. This picnic area offers scenic views of the Columbia river and Bonneville dam and is said to be one of our most beautiful places for

picnics and scenic values.

Zig Zag district reports that Lost Creek Horse camp was officially dedicated, Saturday, July 27. More than 200 Oregon State Sheriff's posse members participated in the dedication. The public was invited.

Trails

All trails are open and maintenance is in progress on several trails. Reports from all districts indicate that insect repellent is a must if you want to enjoy your hike. Mosquitoes are out in full force. Inquiries should be made at ranger stations about specific trails.

The Eagle Creek trail is one of the most heavily traveled trails on Mt. Hood. This trail is an alternate route of the Oregon Skyline trail and begins at the Eagle Creek campground and ends at Wahtum lake — a distance of approximately 13 miles. The main scenic features are found along the first 6½ miles of the trail.

Fishing

Wahtum lake is producing some nice rainbow trout. Fishing improving along the lower Collawash river. Skookum lake has also produced some nice fish. Generally, fishing conditions are improving forest-wide.

Special Items

Several deer have been seen along U. S. Highway 30. A deer was hit on the highway in the Rooster Rock area so beware of deer crossing the highways in the Gorge area.

Rhododendrons still showing in the high elevations. The fire danger remains low due to rain but don't let your fire guard down. Hood River district reports that right-of-way slash along Highway 35 has cured to the "red slash" stage. Travelers along this route should be extra careful, use your ash tray, not your forest to put out your smokes!

Bump Causes Minor Injury

Only minor injury to one passenger resulted from a rear-end auto accident on W. Proctor at Clover street Sunday, according to Sandy Police Chief Dean Coffey.

Edith Buckland, wife of Marshall Buckland, Portland, received minor injuries when the car her husband was driving was struck in the rear while stopped at a crosswalk. Also in the car, but uninjured was the couple's 4-year-old son James.

Driver of the car that ran into the Buckland car was Erich Rappi of Sandy, who told Chief Coffey he had stopped, but thought Buckland started again so he proceeded forward.

Horse Influenza Virus Hits Here

The appearance of equine influenza in the Eastern United States in February was followed by a relatively explosive outbreak occurring through the U. S. Its spread has been rapid. It was first noted in Oregon, the latter part of May.

Results on preliminary laboratory and epidemiological studies indicate that the virus and the disease were apparently both new to the U. S. and that two viruses are responsible for the illness.

In the present outbreak of equine influenza there have been conflicting reports of concurrent disease in humans associated with sick horses and outbreaks in stables. The etiology of the human cases is unknown.

Two viruses have been isolated from sick Oregon horses by the Oregon State Public Health Laboratory. Classification is in process and surveillance is continuing.

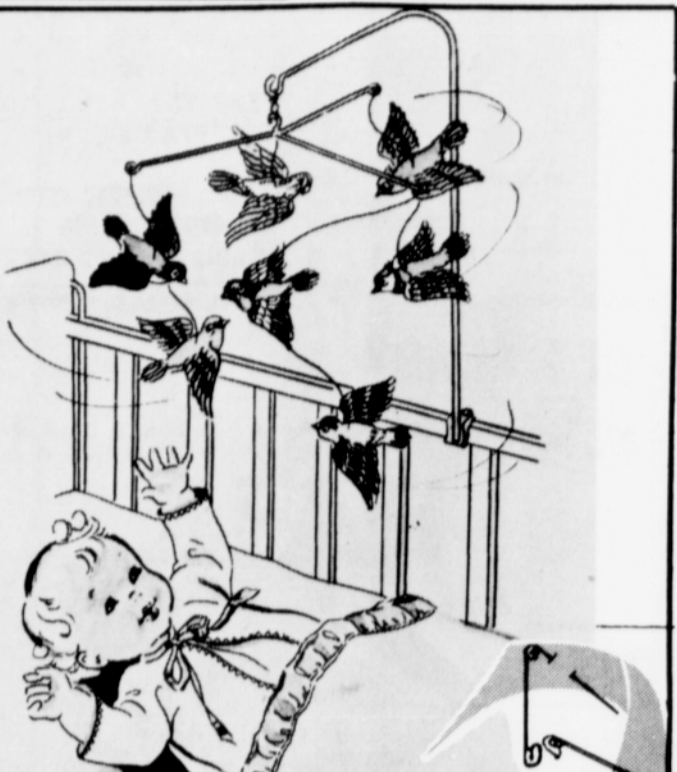
