COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Most of us are becoming more conscious of driving safely and taking precautions when swimming at the beach and the like, but certainly danger lurks all around us. There are hidden "booby traps" that sometimes show up in the most unsuspecting situations.

I read an article recently in one of the national news magazines about a Cleveland housewife appearing at the emergency hospital who could not swallow and could hardly talk. Her tongue was painfully swollen.

This woman's pain was so severe that she had to be given a sedative — then given a poison antidote. Her face and blistered mouth were so painful that for over a week she had to be content with a liquid diet and baby foods.

The cause for all this? Not some strange omen — not at all — but it turned out that while tending her house plants that day she had bitten a piece of stalk from one of the plants called Dieffenbachia.

Pretty Plant Poisons
Dieffenbachia is a popular and widely used specimen plant. Other names for this are "dumb cane" and "mother-in-law plant." It contains calcium oxalate which could be fatal to a small child who accidentally chewed a

piece of the stalk and swallowed the juice.

This isn't meant to overly alarm anyone, but more to alert you to the fact that safety isn't just some intangible thing for someone else to do something about — it's a job for which we have to assume some personal responsibility.

Safety, much like citizenship, is something we believe in but don't always practice.

Could I suggest that you make a safety inspection around your home? Are the pesticides locked up and are the aspirins and other medicines up away from the reach of children?

Is the gasoline for the power mower stored in a metal container or in a glass jug? Just a few minutes spent in correcting some of these hazards could well make you "healthier, wealthier and wiser."
