

Mt. Hood National Forest Weekly Recreation Report

Roads
Recreationists traveling on the Collawash district will find heavy equipment still operating 2½ miles up the Collawash River road. The road is being oiled up to Rho ridge, causing sloppy conditions. You may also find trucks hauling gravel from the 4-mile mark on Bagby road to Pegleg Falls.

A portion of the Skyline road by Warm Springs meadow is being widened and rocked by a logging company so motorists traveling the Skyline may have to wait awhile to get through. A popular route to the Olallie lakes area is via the Clackamas and Pinhead roads. You can get directions on this from the ranger station at Ripplebrook or the supervisor's office in Portland.

Trails
Cables have been installed at Coe Creek crossing on the Timberline trail. The crossing is still hazardous and hikers are discouraged to attempt it.

The Columbia Gorge district reports that the Perdition trail offers hikers some beautiful scenic views. The trail starts 1 mile up the Larch mountain trail at which point you can view Multnomah falls. Further down the trail you will see

a beautiful view of the Columbia River islands, and further on, the Benson reservoir. The trail ends ¼ mile up the Wahkeena trail and only a ¼ mile to the sound of falling waters and the Wahkeena falls picnic grounds.

Maintenance is still under way on most trail systems in the forest.

Campgrounds
Ranger Wingle of the Zig Zag district reports the Trillium lake boat launching ramp has been completed. However, there is still no drinking water at the lake, but they hope to have the wells completed by the end of this summer.

Clear lake has receded in depth since this lake is used primarily as an irrigation project for the Maupin, Tygh valley area. The water is let out through the dam and Clear creek ditch to serve the valleys to the east. Fishing prospects are not too good due to this.

Fishing
The Sandy river and upper tributaries should produce well from recent planting. Fair to good trout angling reported on the Salmon river and Trillium lake. Camp creek above Rhododendron is expected to produce well. Fishing continues good on the lower Collawash, Hot Springs fork and Bull of the Woods area. The east fork of Hood river has perked up with recent Game Commission plants.

Special Items
The chairlift and snow cats at Timberline Lodge are operating when weather permits. The 1000' rope tow is no longer operating.

There will be no more permits issued for digging of trees and shrubs until late fall when the rain sets in.

Huckleberries still ripening in higher elevations. Should have more information on this subject by next week.
