Gunderson Plans New Subdivision

Allan Gunderson is planning a subdivision in the east part of Sandy, the Sandy planning commission was told at its last regular meeting. Joe Kozlovski, who told the commission about the plan, said that since the city lacks a subdivision ordinance it is not in a position to make any specific requirements. Kozlovski told the group he had talked with Dick Close of the Multnomah county planning commission and explained to them the proposed subdivision ordinance. They plan to comply with it, he said, and will soon present a preliminary plan to the Sandy planning commission. Kozlovski said he had been told the proposed retirement village project of the Episcopal church that was brought to the attention of the commission some months ago had not been abandoned, although no action has been taken on it.

Three Groups Build Hideway Lake Camp

Co-operation is providing another public campground on the Mt Hood National Forest. Supervisor, Paul E. Neff, announced today that progress is good on a campground construction project on the shore of Hideway lake. Located 5 airline miles northeast of the Ripplebrook Ranger station this newest, nine-unit camp, will be dedicated Sunday, Aug. 25. A piped water system and signs remain to be installed. The Autzen Foundation has provided funds for the road construction, assembly of tables and stoves and building the water system. Volunteers from each of the three groups have worked weekends to dig, cut, hammer and blast the trees, holes, tables, stoves and toilets. A voluntary work party on the weekend of Aug. 17-18 finished the big job, and a public dedication will be held Sunday, Aug. 25. The three contributing groups wish to demonstrate the combined interest of the timber industry, sportsmen groups and the U. S. Forest Service in multiple use management of the forest. A road has been constructed, pit toilets installed, nine tables, stoves and tent spots constructed and installed, and dead trees and snags cut down.
