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Fish and Game Program Slashed for Two Years

Faced with a critical financial outlook, the game commission, at its meeting in Portland Tuesday, slashed operations for the biennium more than \$800,000 below the level authorized by the legislature.

Phil Schneider, state game director, said the cutback in fish and game programs for the next two years was necessary because a new forecast of revenue is well below that projected when the budget was prepared more than a year ago. The new estimate is \$7,755,000.

Based on previous experience, Schneider advised, it had been estimated that about \$8,800,000 would be available for expenditures, not including the cost of enforcement. Legislative action on the commission's budget, coupled with further action by the Emergency Board to accommodate a new pay scale, set commission expenditures for the biennium at \$8,371,862. But, Schneider said, there is not enough money in sight to carry out the program authorized by the legislature.

No Reserve Fund

Schneider said that several factors contributed to the problem faced by the commission. Seasonal help was cut severely in all phases of the commission's program as well as capital outlay.

Habitat improvement was given a severe cut in game operations as well as postponement of the planned expansion of the E. E. Wilson game farm. Planned developments at game management areas and on big game winter ranges were curtailed. Schneider said that federal funds, which require matching money from the state, would barely cover routine maintenance of these areas.

First, there was no reserve remaining in the game fund to carry over into the present biennium.

Second, for the first time in 20 years or more the sale of hunting and fishing licenses leveled off and revenues from this source will be about \$460,000 less than anticipated.

Third, revenue from federal sources will be \$235,000 less than forecast.

In addition, \$148,000 of salmon license money was cut out of the commission's budget and \$25,000 was appropriated for expenses of the legislative Interim Committee on Wildlife.

Schneider stated that the commission will have close to 1½ million dollars less to spend than was available in the previous biennium.

Every function of the commission's management program will be at a reduced level, according to Schneider. The only game fund activity which is increased, he said, is game law enforcement with a budget increase of \$160,000.

Activities Cut

In order to stay within the new projected budget, the commission cut a number of important fish and game activities. Cuts were made across the board and in some instances planned projects were eliminated completely.

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Youth for Christ

The second night in a three-night feature entitled "The Best of Billy Graham" will be held at Portland Youth for Christ, Saturday, Aug. 31 at 7:30 at Benson high school. The program will be premiering the documentary story of Billy Graham's life made by NBC for release throughout their network.
