

Respect for Surf Keeps Outing Safe

With a holiday weekend ahead many Sandy and mountain residents will exchange their fir-and-fern environment for a taste of sea and sand at one of the Oregon beaches.

Beach combing, picnics, surfing and hiking in the salty sea air are great family fun—if everyone has a good healthy respect for the ocean, its sandy beaches and high-rising cliffs.

If you play in the surf pick the right place and time. Check the tide table before going on the beach, or in the water. Tide books are available at motels, sport shops or sporting-goods stores. Most tide books include coastal fishing and shell-fish regulation also.

Outgoing tides are the most dangerous for swimming and surfing because they can pull almost anything, including huge logs, out to sea. Incoming tides are dangerous to unwary fishermen and explorers.

From the coast come a set of safety pointers that everyone would do well to heed if he wishes to come back from his beach outing hale, hearty and with the same number of little folk he started with.

First of all, say the safety specialist, never turn your back to the surf. Extra high waves come unexpectedly and are especially dangerous to children and fishermen on low rocks and jetties.



Driftwood Dangerous
Never play around logs and driftwood that can be rolled or tossed by unexpected waves. Many people have been killed

often stranding them on rocks that submerge with the tide. A car left parked on the beach may be found under several feet of water on its owner's return.

Undertows and riptides—strong downward and outward



currents of water—rush out to sea at certain spots along the beach with such force that a person can be swept off his feet and carried out. Tides flowing in or out of bays and

around the jetties also cause some very strong currents. **Use Marked Trails**
If yours is a hiking and climbing family be sure to use

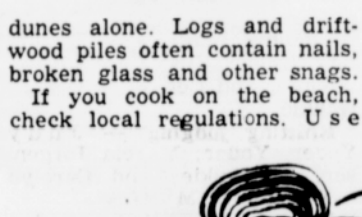


the safe, marked trails and stay behind retaining walls. Cliff climbing is strictly for the birds. Cliff trails are slippery in wet weather. Shallow-rooted shrubs on coastal cliffs can't be trusted for climbing support—the thrill is gone when an adventurer falls to the rocks below.

Don't let children explore the beach, surf, rocks or sand



dunes alone. Logs and driftwood piles often contain nails, broken glass and other snags. If you cook on the beach, check local regulations. Use

Mt. Hood National Forest Weekly Recreation Report

WEEKLY RECREATION REPORT

The Lakes Ranger district reports that the betterment project on the Skyline Rd. near Warm Springs has been completed and the road is now in excellent condition. The Larch mountain road has been black topped all the way and is in excellent condition for a "dust free" ride to the top.

The Sandstone Rd. on the Collawash district has been oiled to Wards Meadow and the Rho Ridge road has been oiled at the Collawash junction up to Grahams Pass. Heavy equipment still operating on lower Collawash River Rd.

Most unsurfaced roads are very dusty at this time, be sure to reduce speed when visibility is hampered. Watch for logging trucks on all districts.

Trails
All trail work on the Hood River district has been completed for this year. Inquire at the Parkdale Ranger station for detailed information on specific trails in the area.

The Eagle Creek trail is in good condition and is one of the most heavily hiked trails on the Mt. Hood. The trail is blasted into perpendicular cliffs which pass Metlake falls, 108 ft. high, and Punch Bowl falls at the 2 1/2 mile point on the trail, plus many other beautiful sights on the way. This trail ends at Wahtum lake, approximately 14 miles from the starting point at Eagle Creek campground.

You will find all trails in the forest are open but some still being maintained.

Oregon State Police, the U. S. Coast Guard, the U. S. Forest Service, the Fire department or the Civil Air Patrol. Dial O—the operator will help. But those who follow these safety suggestions can enjoy Oregon's beautiful beaches in safety.

Notice is hereby given that the Oregon State Highway Commission has proposed plans to reconstruct the Mt. Hood Highway (U.S. 30) between Sandy, Ore. and the Highway Commission at the present time is studying three alternate plans of construction which are as follows:
Alternate 1: One-way couplet, with eastbound traffic using Main Street and westbound traffic using Proctor Avenue.
Alternate 2: Four lanes on Proctor Avenue with a 14-foot median (with left-turn duck lane), two 12-foot travel lanes, and two 14-foot travel lanes. Sixty-six feet between curbs, with no provision for parking.
Alternate 3: Four lanes on Proctor Avenue with a 14-foot median (with left-turn duck lane), two 12-foot travel lanes, and two 14-foot travel lanes. Sixty-six feet between curbs, with no provision for parking.
This notice is given in compliance with federal regulations pertaining to this type of project whereby it is required that public notice be given to enable interested persons to request a hearing on the proposed project. If any interested person desires such a hearing, a request for a hearing should be directed to the Sandy City Council before September 10, 1963.
