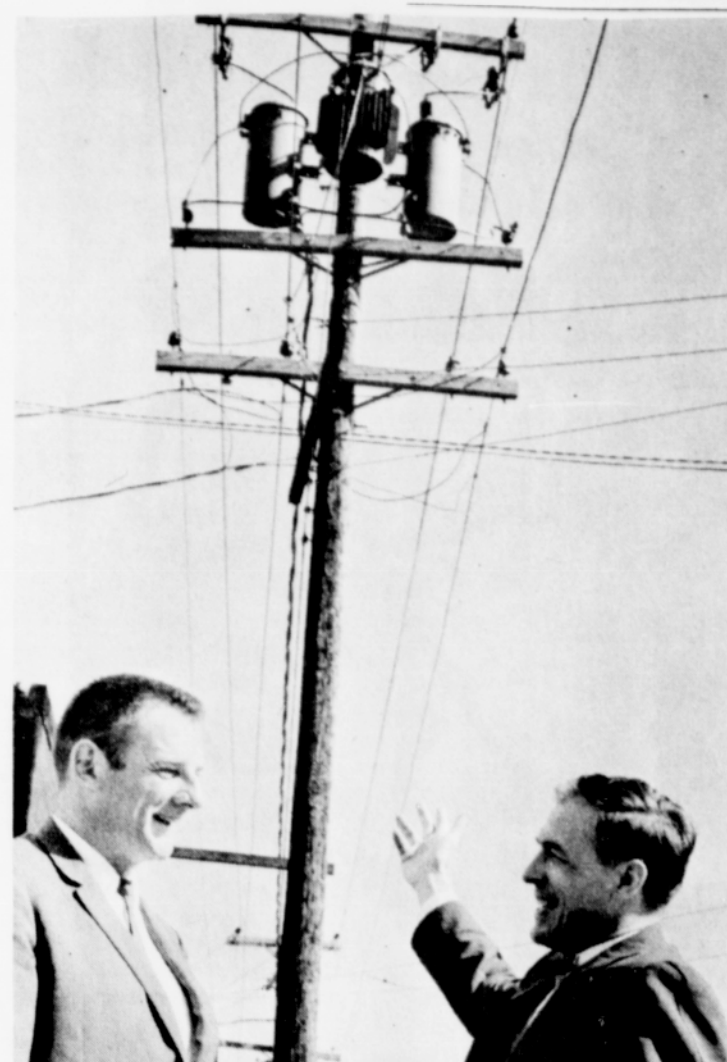

Lew Welts, representing the National Turkey Federation, discussed prices to be expected by turkey growers during the coming year. It is expected that this year's slightly larger turkey crop will bring favorable prices.
