Mr. and Mrs. Everett Stone of Boise, Ida., were week guests of his brother and wife, Elmer and Mable Stone, Sandy.

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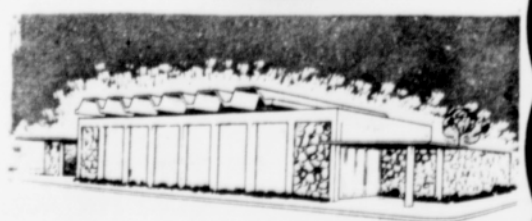
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
