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UGN Drive Gains

Tri-County United Good Neighbors volunteers in Sandy have raised to date \$1,066, for 26.2 per cent of this area's quota of \$4,064.

Olin Bignall, Sandy area UGN chairman, is optimistic, but cautious, reminded of the fact that the campaign must go over its goal if the 87 UGN services are to provide adequate care for citizens of this community.

"The UGN campaign here is now fully under-way. It's not a matter of how long we have to go but how quickly we can get the job done," said Bignall.

The Residential Section of the drive began its door-to-door appeal for funds this week. Local volunteer solicitors will cover almost every home, apartment, court and duplex in this area to help raise a vital amount of the overall UGN goal of \$3,618,830. Workers expect to wrap up this phase of the campaign within two weeks.

The local chairman stressed the fact that greater demands than ever before will be placed on UGN agencies for the services they provide to citizens of this area in the coming year.

These services range all the way from neighborhood youth centers, that provide recreation as well as teaching youngsters a diversified number of skills -- to rehabilitating someone who has lost an arm or leg in an accident, or supplying blood to a person undergoing open heart surgery.
