'Dry Berry' Control

Tracy Roth, Eldon Evans, and Cecil McKay, three Clackamas County farmers, are cooperating with the Oregon State University Extension Service to help find a control for crumbly or dry berry. This is a disease that causes a reduction in yield by affecting size and quality of canberries in this and other counties of Oregon.

The spray program followed by Roth, Evans, and McKay is as follows: One spray of Bordeaux or tribasic copper on October 10th, one spray on November 1st, and one spray on January 1st. It is the feeling of the Extension Department and the writer, Clackamas county agent Jerry Larson, that if this program corrects the disease problem it will mean many additional dollars in the pockets of canberry growers. The county has 1600 acres of blackcaps with cash receipts of \$480,000. This is based on one thousand pound per acre yield and with complete control of this disease the yield per acre would exceed one ton, which would push the cash receipts over \$1,000,000.

This program was initiated by E.K. Vaughn, professor of plant pathology, and I. MacSwan, Extension plant pathology specialist, from Oregon State University.

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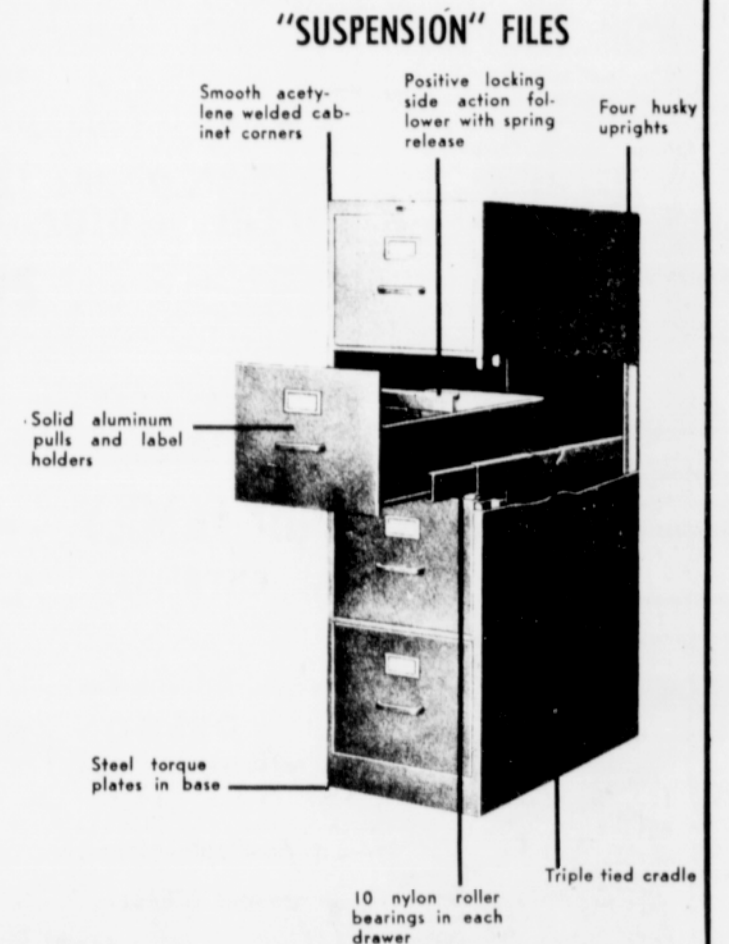
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
