Beyond Our Horizon

With Europe moving rapidly towards economic unification and, with the exception of France, no one, or group of nations having obvious unilateral aspirations, we certainly ask, why is it necessary for the United States to maintain such large military forces in Europe?

Western Europe has a population comparable to that of United States. Their industries are modern, they have highly skilled workers and capable executives.

Russian economic potential is far below that of Western Europe. One outstanding aspect is that almost half of her manpower is required in agriculture and even then they are seldom able to generate surpluses. The current "wheat deal" bears witness.

Point one is that we are not maintaining military forces in Europe to defend Western Europe. We are maintaining them there to defend the United States.

We are a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). This organization was formed for mutual defense after World War II when Europe was prostrate. We were the only nation then capable of putting punch into the organization and we of course did so for our own self protection.

Any mutual organization has one strike against it from the beginning, i.e. decision making. National sovereignty and pride complicate the organizational aspects of any international force. Further the monetary cost and national reluctance to take manpower out of the labor pool affect unit participation. Finally, the young men of Europe are just in no mood to join the army.

We have recognized the foregoing for years and have constantly been prodding and cajoling our NATO Allies to provide at least the forces which they initially agreed upon. These they are well able to furnish and economically, if not psychologically, much more.

De Gaulle has been maintaining that we are no longer to be relied upon for the defense of Western Europe. But rather than push for greater European participation in NATO, he looks to a Europe under the leadership of a revitalized France--something that could arouse the old animosities that has kept Europe in turmoil for centuries.

Germany has placed faith in U.S. leadership. She has contributed assigned forces on schedule. However within the past fortnight, even their faith has been shaken as to U.S. intentions. So much so that it was necessary for our Secretary of State, Mr. Dean Rusk, to make a hurried visit to Bonn and assure the new Chancellor, Ludwig Erhard, that our military policy towards the defense of Europe had not changed.

The triggering effect for German doubts as to our intentions was the air lift of a full armored division to Europe, commonly referred to as the "Big Lift."

Now another fly has entered the picture.

With telephone communications readily available between the President and Mr. Krushchev and the purported correspondence between the two heads of state, there is certainly room for question as to our future role and activities in Europe.

Driving the freeways requires quite a different technique from driving city streets. The Portland Traffic Safety Commission lists the following tips for safe, comfortable travel on the super-highways: 1. Keep up with traffic. 2. Enter and leave the freeway smoothly, accelerating or decelerating as required to merge with traffic movement ahead. 3. Change lanes as little as possible, always checking carefully to the sides and rear before you signal and make your move.

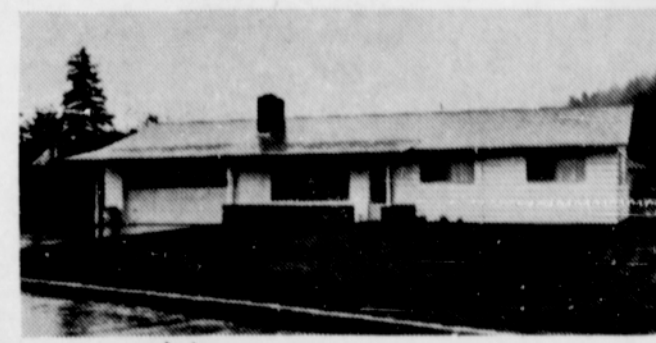

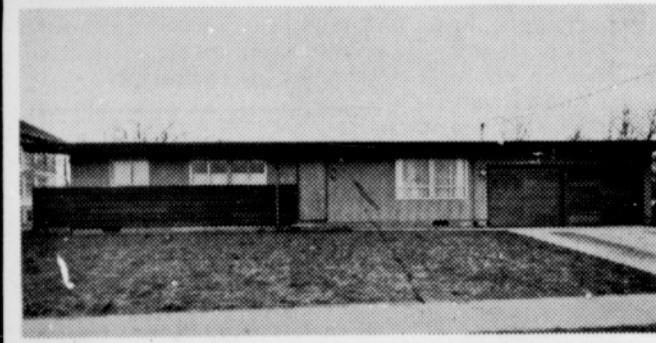

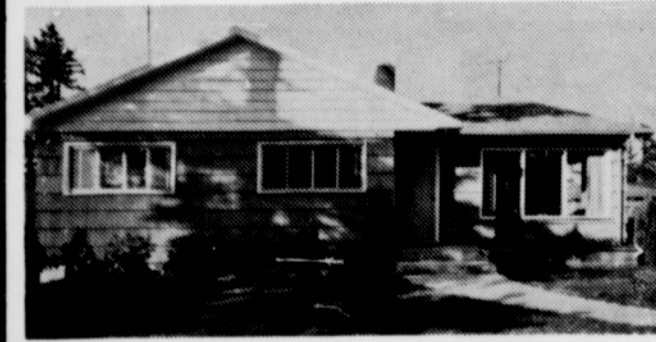
