Starting in January, housewives in the Portland area will be able to buy ripe, ready-to-eat pears directly from the grocer's shelf. This may not sound like anything new, but it is actually a revolution in the pear-marketing field.

Pears, like bananas, develop their best flavor when picked green and allowed to ripen off the tree. Did you ever try to eat a ripe pear picked directly from the tree?

They're usually punky, dry, and almost flavorless.

Properly ripened pears are considered by many to be the Queen of all fruits. They're easily digested, they furnish an important quantity of vitamins and minerals, and are comparatively low in calories. They're popular with youngsters (and oldsters, too) because they're soft and easy to bite into.

To develop their maximum quality, pears must be carefully harvested and stored and they must be ripened under carefully controlled conditions. Once ripe, a pear is extremely perishable. The storage life of a ripe pear is actually shorter than that of a ripe tomato.

A recent survey by the United States Department of Agriculture shows that most homemakers would rather buy ripe winter pears than hard ones. The survey also shows that half the women buying pears take them home and use them immediately without waiting for them to ripen. Chances are, it will be a long time before these women buy pears again.

In order for the grocer to provide ripe, ready-to-eat pears for the consumer, he must adapt his storage system to provide a ripening room especially for pears. Once the pears are ripe, they must be sold within a few days to prevent deterioration.

CRAZY BISCUITS

2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
4 teaspoons baking powder
2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 cup shortening
2/3 cup milk

Sift ingredients into a bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk and stir until dough follows fork around bowl. Knead slightly. Pat out on lightly floured board and cut. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 450 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes, or until brown. com the files of Mrs. Lloyd A. Lyon, Lebanon.

SCALLOPED POTATOES

1 can cheddar cheese soup
1/2 cup milk
4 cups thinly sliced potatoes
1 small onion, thinly sliced
1 Tablespoon butter or margarine
Paprika

Stir cheddar cheese soup until smooth; gradually add milk. In buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole, arrange alternate layers of potatoes, onion and sauce. Dot top with butter. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake covered at 375 degrees for one hour. Uncover; bake 15 minutes more. Serves 4 to 6. From the files of Mrs. Garland McCulloch, Sandy.

SPICY COFFEE CAKE

2 1/2 cups flour
1 cup brown sugar
3/4 cup white sugar
1 teaspoon nutmeg
3/4 cup cooking oil
1 cup sour milk (or add teaspoon vinegar to cup sweet milk)
1 teaspoon soda
2 eggs
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Stir flour three times. Blend with sugar and oil. Take out 3/4 cup of this mixture and save for topping. To the rest add sour milk, eggs, and soda dissolved in a tablespoon of hot water. Beat well and put in greased pan (8 x 12"). To the 3/4 cup topping add 1 level teaspoon (or more) cinnamon and chopped nuts. Sprinkle all on top of cake batter. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes. Delicious for breakfast or supper. Serves 6 to 8. From the files of Mrs. Donald Maas, Portland.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

By proclamation of the Governor, a special session of the 52nd Legislature convened at Salem last Monday. Predictions flowed fast and furiously as to both the length of the session and as to the possible outcome in the way of legislation.

Many reflections have been made back to the special session of 1957. The situation at that time, however, was entirely different. By reason of the fact that the State income in 1957 had been considerably higher than was anticipated,

the special session cut taxes by about 20 per cent. The special session lasted only 19 days, during which time only the Rules Committee and Taxation Committee were in operation.

Personally, I predict a session of about three weeks' duration. I would expect to see only three committees in operation, the Taxation Committee, Ways and Means Committee, and Rules Committee. While there is nothing to prevent the introduction of other items of business at a special session, I anticipate that the members of both Houses will agree to consideration of matters dealing solely with the budget and taxation. As a member of the House Rules Committee, I shall do everything I can to expedite the session.

My further predictions are to the effect that while we will probably pass a cigarette tax and a "one-shot" tax of some type, the passage of a sales tax in any form (by reference to the people or otherwise) will be deferred until at least next session of the Legislature. It would therefore be necessary to make substantial cuts in the budget.

There are several reasons why I feel that a sales tax will not be passed now, despite state-wide polls indicating its popularity. First, there are several public groups already dedicated to having a referendum if the Legislature passes a sales tax in special session. This would force another special election, and the Bill would stand a good chance of defeat.

A second reason is that I believe that the feeling of the people is one of more economy at this point, and not just a question of taxation. While the two problems are obviously interrelated, there is no need of raising taxes if we don't raise the outgo.

Very simply stated, I think the people of the State have indicated a wish to see some economies in Government at all levels. Budget cuts are therefore in order.

A third reason, and a very practical one, as to why I feel there would be no sales tax, is that it could be very embarrassing to defend politically for at least a couple of reasons.

There are several Legislators who are already very sensitive and defensive about some of their votes on a number of taxation matters.

The argument will be advanced to the effect that while a sales tax appears inevitable, "we need to give the matter more study." What this means is that we will pass the buck to the next Legislature.

Another suggestion which has been made is that the Legislature give power to the Governor, by a single Bill, to adjust and cut budgets in areas where he cannot now make such adjustments, particularly regarding basic school support and general government.

By simply doing this, we could give the Governor the power to deal with the necessary budgetary adjustments without taking the time of the full Legislature to do this. Legislative feeling appears to be against this, however, inasmuch as the power which the Governor already has is very broad.
