## College Board Tests Scheduled At Centennial

Centennial high school has been designated as a testing center for the College Entrance Examination Board tests. Formerly students in this area had to go to a Portland high school to take their tests.

The CEEB tests are required by most colleges for admissions and placement. The Oregon State system requires the morning test--the Scholastic Aptitude Test--and two Achievement tests--one in English composition and one in math. The U. of Oregon also requires an achievement test in a foreign language if the student has taken two years of the foreign language in high school.

The Scholastic Aptitude Test is a three-hour test given in the morning of each test date. It is designed to measure how well the student has developed the verbal and mathematical skills needed to perform the academic work required in college. The Achievement Tests, administered in the afternoon of each test date, are one-hour tests designed to measure the student's general level of achievement in a subject field.

The first test will be administered Saturday, Dec. 7, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

## Eagle Creek Salmon Angling To Be Cut

The closing of Eagle Creek to salmon angling from April 1 through Sept. 30 to allow a greater escapement of adult fish to the spawning beds constitutes one of the major changes in proposed 1964 angling regulations.

The few major changes under tentative rules approved by the game commission at its public hearing in Portland, Nov. 6 were protective measures for chinook salmon in resting pools or on spawning beds. The final regulations for the 1964 season will be set by the commission on Nov. 22, following a two-week interval.

Except for several minor changes in dates and deadlines, anglers will be fishing under almost the identical regulations as they did last season.
