Hood Forest Permits Are Now Ready For Christmas Tree Cutters in Mountains

Permits to cut individual family Christmas trees on designated areas in the Mt. Hood National Forest may be purchased for \$1. Seven of the eight ranger districts on the forest will keep ranger office open or have someone in the area on specific weekends to make these permits available to those who cannot find the time to cut their tree on week days.

Following are locations where permits and instructions for locating and cutting trees may be obtained.

Columbia Gorge Ranger District will have a man on the Larch Mountain road near the National Forest boundary on two weekends—Dec. 7-8 and Dec. 14-15.

Zigzag Ranger Station about 45 miles east of Portland on U. S. Highway 26, will sell permits Dec. 7 to Dec. 22.

Parkdale Ranger Station in Parkdale about 17 miles south of Hood River and just west of State Highway 35 will sell permits Dec. 7 and 8 and 14 and 15. Permits will be sold on the Lake Branch road, however, interested persons should stop at the ranger station for directions.

Bear Springs Ranger Station about 76 miles east of Portland

on U. S. Highway 26 and State Highway 216 to Maupin, will sell permits daily until Dec. 24.

Estacada Ranger Station in Estacada, on State Highway 211 about 30 miles southeast of Portland will sell permits on the Calico road Dec. 7, 8, 14, 15, 21 and 22. Public should stop at ranger station to obtain map to cutting area.

Ripplebrook Ranger Station (Collawash District) on week days until Dec. 24, in the Big Creek area on Saturday and Sunday until Dec. 24. The route to Big Creek will be posted at the Ranger Station on weekends. The Ranger Station is located about 27 miles up the Clackamas river southeast of Estacada.

Dufur Ranger Station Dufur will sell permits at the Ranger Station on Dec. 9-13. A man will be on the Friend-Flag Point road to sell permits the weekends of Dec. 7, 8, 14 and 15.

The public is reminded that each Ranger District has a limited number of permits available and these will be sold on a first come first served basis. Directors to the cutting areas and other instructions should be obtained at the individual ranger stations.

work smarter — not harder

THE less you have to do, the less time you find to do it in, so we've been told. There's a lot of truth in this too.

When you need some one to sit up with a sick friend, it's the widow with six children who takes in washings that finds the time. She probably has a time plan but she doesn't call it that. It's in her head and she expects to get her work done each day.

To keep up with a busy holiday season, start now to make a list of EXTRA jobs to be done. Portion them out for the days ahead on a large calendar. Work will get done and you'll save that last minute hectic confusion.

IF your asphalt, vinyl or linoleum tile floor doesn't shine, the trouble may be with the rinsing. You must rinse thoroughly after sudsing, before applying wax. Floor also should be completely dry before waxing. Detergent or water mixed with wax causes streaks and a dull finish.
