Expansion Budget Disclosed By West Coast Telephone Co.

West Coast Telephone company's construction expenditures next year that will rank well above the expansion budgets of nearly all of the nation's 2800 independent telephone firms.

This was reported today by West Coast's Oregon district manager, Lyle E. Cross of Beaverton, in announcing still another record construction outlay for his company is 1964.

West Coast has allocated more than \$17,000,000 for projects in its 73 exchanges in Oregon, Washington and northern California next year, according to Cross. He said the total was the greatest in the company's 35-year history, topping the previous high in 1963 by \$3,000,000.

The new budget earmarks \$7,000,000 for Oregon, compared to 1963 construction costs in the state which Cross set at \$5,633,000.

Cross described as "a high point in the company annals" the conversion next year of the last exchanges in the system to dial operation. The exchange at Enterprise will be cut over in July and the departure from manual service will become complete in November when automatic equipment starts functioning in the Clatskanie office.

In 1964, once again—according to the West Coast statement—the Beaverton and Gresham exchanges will draw the heaviest shares of the Oregon construction dollar.

West Coast's Gresham division manager, Curtis Straw, advised the Gresham Outlook that the budget carries \$1,138,330 for 12 plant, equipment and building projects in the local exchange in the over-

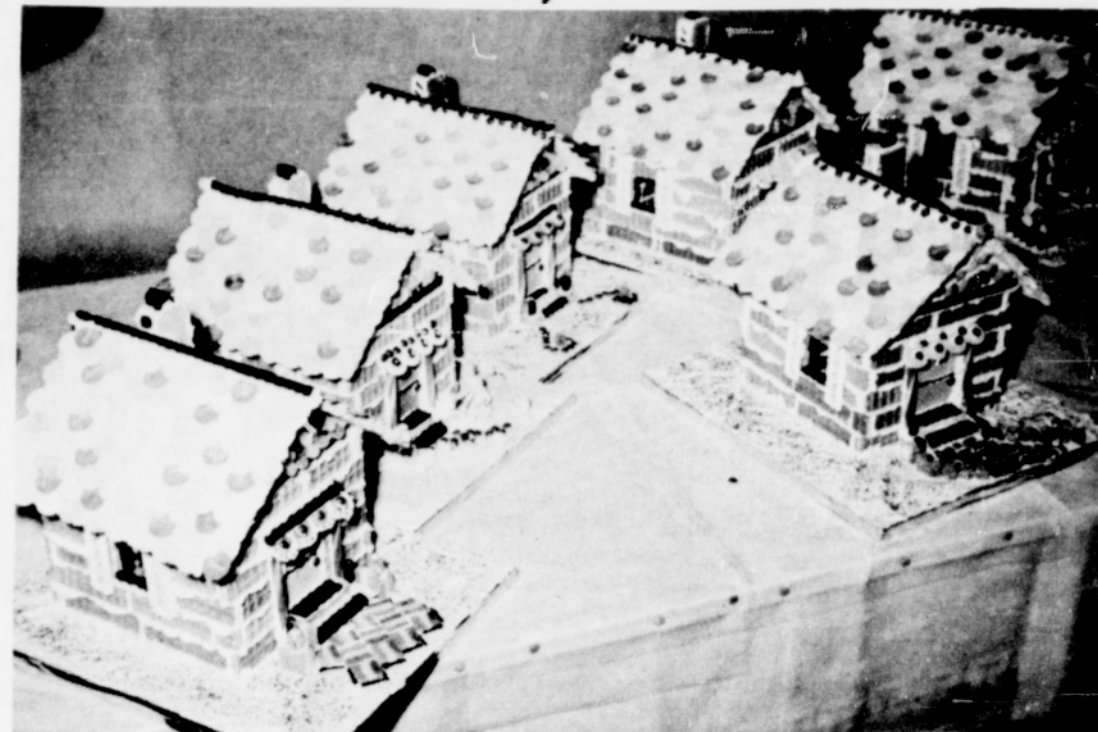

Sandy Phone Book Coming Out Friday

Distribution of West Coast Telephone company's new directory for the Gresham and Sandy exchanges will begin Friday.

West Coast's Gresham division manager, Curtis Straw, reported that the incoming and outgoing books have an identical number of pages and like state and civic sections.

Additionally, Straw said, the most frequently appearing surname in both books is Johnson. Surnames in the alphabetical section range from Abbott to Zumwalt.

The 1964 publication has the same number of alphabetical and classified pages as the one it supplants—64 and 84, respectively. But the company has had 15,600 of the directories printed this year, as compared with the last previous press run of 14,700.

There are some 11,000 subscribers in the two exchanges. Straw said they may start using the new directory as soon as it

arrives at their homes and places of business.
