Business Tax Fees Past Due

Within the next few days the city will send letters to all local merchants who have neglected to pay the business tax license fee. Recipients will be notified that the period of grace for initial payment of the tax has ended and that failure to pay immediately will result in appropriate action being taken against them. According to the ordinance, failure to pay can result in a fine of not less than \$10 and not more than \$100.

To date, with 74 city and 67 outside businesses purchasing licenses the city has collected \$2,405 in fees. The money thus collected will not go into the general fund, but into a special fund to improve the local business climate through additional parking facilities, police protection and recreational and park sites.

The exact usage to which the money will be put has not yet been determined and it may be allowed to accrue for a period of years if a major project, such as public tennis courts or a community swimming pool, is decided upon.
