Rapid Reading Demonstration To Be Given in Gresham Tonight

A free public demonstration of a rapid reading method will be given at a meeting in the Gresham city hall at 8 o'clock this evening (Thursday).

Greshamites are invited to watch the demonstration, to be presented by the Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics Institute.

"People are welcome to bring their books and see one of our graduates read through it many times faster than the average person said John Engel of the Institute staff.

The Institute conducts a 30-hour course that teaches people how to read from 3 to 10 times faster, with improved comprehension.

"Reading Dynamics" is a discovery of a teacher, Mrs. Evelyn Wood. While working on a master's degree 12 years ago, she handed an 80-page term paper to her professor at the University of Utah.

She looked on with amazement as he flipped through the 80 pages once and didn't miss a detail. His reading speed was 6,000 words per minute.

She grew determined to learn the secret of exceptional reading speed. She spent two years studying the methods of 50 persons who read from 1,500 to 2,000 words a min-

ute, or six to eight times the rate of the average reader.

Her research pointed to several things these fast readers had in common. They all read down a page instead of from left to right. And they absorbed the meaning of whole areas of a page at a time—not just a line or two.

In teaching herself the same method, she became convinced that any normal reader could acquire the same trait.

Setting up courses in several cities, her "Reading Dynamics" method attracted wide attention and glowing praise from people who took it.

THOMAS G. HALE

Funeral services were held in Pleasant Home Methodist church Monday afternoon for Thomas Grove Hale, 63, of Rt. 1, Box 887, a longtime Boring resident and owner of a motor repair shop.

He died Friday after suffering a heart attack. He was born Oct. 8, 1900, in the Powell Valley home of Arabella and George Hale, pioneer Oregon settlers. He attended Powell Valley and Orient schools.

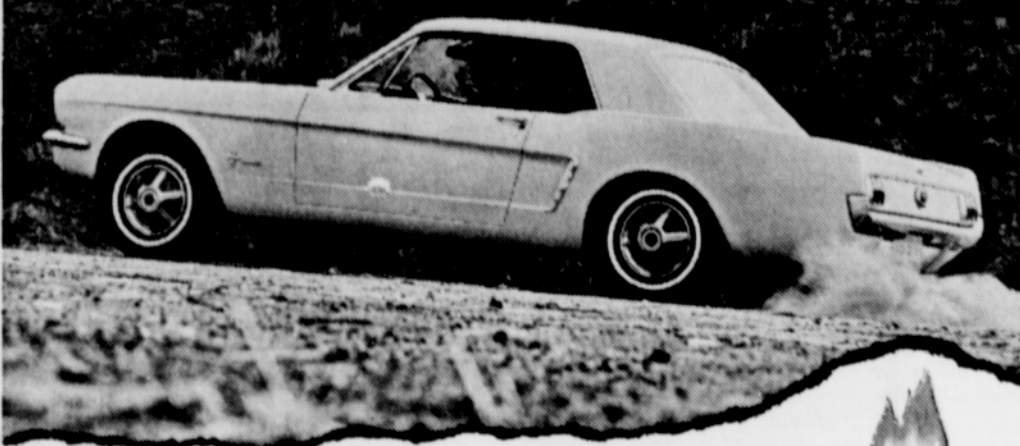
Hale was married to Eileen Sloop on Sept. 5, 1928 and shortly after they moved into a home he had built where the family still resides. For 20 years he was employed by the Portland city waterworks and three of the men he worked with served as honorary pallbearers at the services.
