Mountain Tours Prove Popular

This summer the U. S. Forest Service has been cooperating with Welches PTA in providing a program of conducted tours for the people of the area.

According to reports from Peter Wingle, district ranger at Zig Zag and Mrs. Jean Strong, Welches PTA president, the program has been very successful. Average attendance has been over 60, and the Ramona Falls hike brought out 94.

Except for the two-week period set aside for Red Cross swimming instruction in July, these tours have started on Tuesdays at 9 a.m., at the Zig Zag Ranger Station since June 16.

There are two more trips, possibly three, scheduled before school starts in September. Children under eight must be accompanied by their own parent, otherwise those who will abide by the safety rules are welcome. Bring a sack lunch.

Bus transportation has been generously provided by Welches School District. The U. S. Forest Service and private individuals have also provided transportation when the need arose.

These trips have included a tour of Timberline Lodge; a 4 mile loop hike to Ramona Falls; a picnic lunch at Timothy Lake campground, and a visit to Crown Zellerbach's log peeling and chipping machine in the woods nearby; a trip and a 1 mile hike to Hickman Butte Lookout; and a 4 mile hike to Zig Zag Ranger station overlooking Burnt lake and Mt. Hood.

The Forest Service at Zig Zag reports that over 1,000,000 people enjoyed these facilities on a daily, nose-counting basis last year.

General enjoyment and sight-seeing brought out 762,000. Winter sports were the next most popular (393,000). There were 106,000 picnickers, 22,000 fishermen, 18,000 campers, and 14,000 who came to hike or ride on the well-established trails.

Some 157,000 came to gather forest products for pleasure and others came to hunt, swim, canoe, pursue scientific study or hobbies and other activities.

The weather will determine how many more trips will be taken. Unless unusually warm weather comes to melt the drifts that are still deep along the Timberline Trail, the projected overnight pack trip for older children and parents will have to be cancelled.

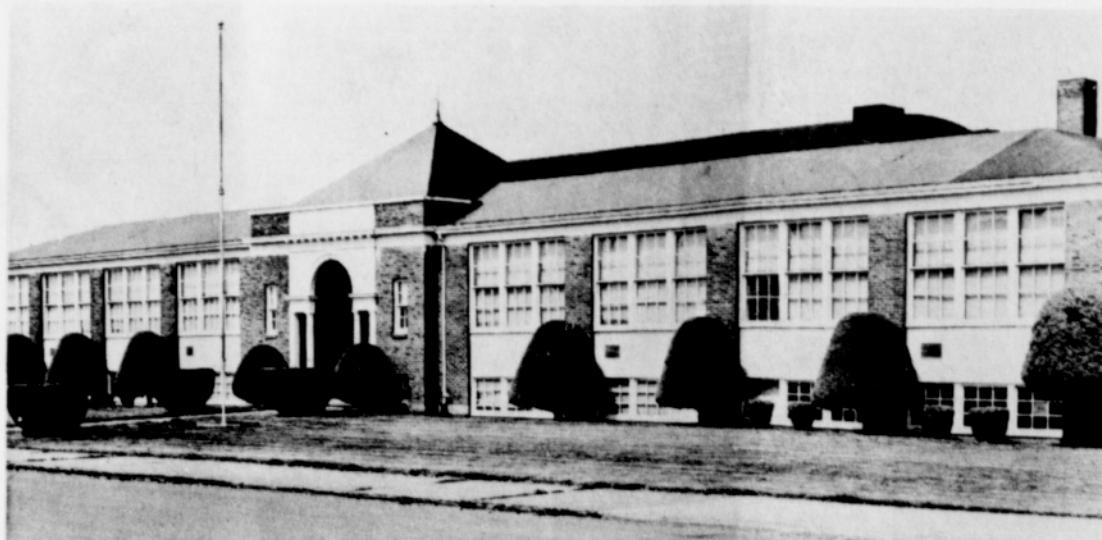
It is also possible the huckleberries may not ripen in time for the Shearer Burn - Trillium lake trip.

Peter Wingle also hopes to show the spectacular sight of a slash burn at night. Other possible trips this year may include a cable logging operation, and logging the old-fashioned way with horses.

The chair-lift trip on Mt. Hood which was postponed the week of Aug. 4 due to rain is to be rescheduled. This trip includes a hike to view the glacier.

The purpose of the program is to help acquaint the local people, children in particular, with the facilities of the unique recreational area in which they live.

Hoodland Dump Open

Mountain residents, who have been accumulating quantities of trash in the last four months will be relieved to know that a call from County Commissioner Stan Ely in Oregon City reported the new Sleepy Hollow Dump has been completed and opened for use Saturday, Aug. 8. The new dump is located at the intersection of Truman and Homestead roads a short distance east of the old site.

Hoodland householders, who have been dumpless since March 1, when the Park Advisory Board reported use of Sleepy Hollow park as a dump was resulting in the destruction and defacing of park facilities and ordered its closure, are warned that use of the new dump is restricted to rubbish only - no wet garbage.

Improvements Aid Hoodland Progress

The state has called for bids on concrete beams and re-inforcing steel for the new bridge being constructed at Brightwood. It was reported by County Commissioner Stan Ely that the bridge, which will replace the old log bridge built many years ago, will cost approximately \$80,000.

Ely, filling in for Commissioner Darrell Jones, who is recovering from surgery, also gave the glad tidings that contracts amounting to \$18,000 have been let by the State Highway Commission for the construction of public toilet facilities at Government Camp.

School Lunch Director Attends Food Meeting

Mrs. Marie Schwartz, director of the Sandy Elementary School lunch program, attended the 18th annual meeting of the American School Food Service Association held in Memorial Coliseum, Portland, Aug. 2-6. More than 3,000 educators, school lunch supervisors, lunch room managers and food service workers were in attendance at the five-day convention.

The convention theme was "School Lunch Opens Doors." Louisville, Kentucky will host the National convention in August 1965, and the theme will be "He Conquers Who Strives".

Stolen Cat Recovered

A 1963 D-4 Caterpillar tractor and Diesel truck stolen a week ago Monday morning from where it was parked in the yard of its owner, A. V. Lundeen, Rt. 2, Sandy, was recovered last Friday near Damascus.

The heavy equipment was discovered in the brush by two women picking berries near Damascus school house. The cat had been unloaded from the truck, and except for a slight dent in the truck nothing was undamaged. Still missing are tools valued between \$500 and \$800 stolen from the Lundeen garage and barn by the thieves at the same time.

Farm Laborer Dies

Edmond Hines, 55, died suddenly Monday afternoon while working at the Aylsworth farm. Death was apparently due to a heart attack. Hines had been employed as a laborer at the farm, just east of Sandy, for the last four years.

Both the purpose of the theft and identity of the thieves remains a mystery.

TB X-Ray Unit Due Here Soon

The Mount Hood Jaycettes are pleased to announce that the TB Chest X-Ray unit will again be available to the residents of the Sandy area. The unit will be in Sandy Tuesday, Aug. 25, at the Sandy Food Center. The hours are 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 4:30 p.m.

It was through the efforts of the Clackamas County Tuberculosis Association that the visit of the unit has been made possible. It is urged that Sandy residents take advantage of this visit, as it is not known when it will be here again. Teachers are reminded that they must have a chest X-ray each year. This is an excellent opportunity to assure ourselves of a healthy community.

Mail Carrier Puts Out Fire

Prompt action by an alert and resourceful mailman saved a mountain home from destruction by fire last Saturday. Dwayne Vedder, Rt. 2, Sandy, who delivers star route mail, was nearing the Kilner house on Faubian road when he noticed the roof shingles were afire.

Honking his horn to attract the attention of the Kilner family he stopped and leaped from the car as they came from the house. While Kilner went to notify the Brightwood Fire Dept., Vedder climbed up on the roof with a garden hose and soaked the burning shingles.

By the time the fire engine arrived he had completely extinguished the blaze. If Vedder had not noticed the fire and acted as he did it is believed the house would have been destroyed. Vedder says a fortunate delay of 15 minutes on his mail route caused him to come by at the right time.
