work smarter (not harder)

Is it safe to bleach colored cotton clothes?

This depends on the bleach you use and also on the dye in the fabric.

Mild powdered bleaches are safe for all fabrics and colors, but be sure to check the label as some powdered bleaches contain chlorine and are not mild.

Liquid chlorine bleach is a heavy duty type. Because of the dyes used today, many colored fabrics (but not all) are bleachable with heavy duty chlorine type bleaches. These bleaches aid in soil removal, so are helpful on heavily soiled colorfast fabrics.

Parents who try to develop responsibility in children by telling them not get very far toward their goal. But involving children in family activities and sharing tasks that challenge children's ability and imagination will help, says Mrs. Roberta Frasier, extension family life specialist at OSU. She suggests that when children are uncooperative about home chores, parents should ask themselves these questions. Are some

of his jobs his own choice? Did he have a part in the planning? Are they real jobs? Are they within his ability? Are they challenging? Do you reward with praise and a pleasant smile? Do you make him feel his job is important to the household? Are your standards too high?

Can I substitute beet sugar in canning?

Certainly says Virginia Weiser, extension nutrition specialist at Oregon State University. There is no chemical difference between cane and beet sugar. They may be used interchangeably in making jellies, for canning or any recipe.

What causes jelly to "weep"? What's wrong when it's cloudy?

Virginia Weiser, OSU nutrition specialist with Extension Service, offers these possible causes for "weeping." There may be too much acid, the paraffin layer may be too thick, or you may have stored the jelly in too warm a place. Cloudy jelly may be due to pouring the mixture too slowly, letting it stand too long before pouring, improper straining of juice, or fruit that was too green.
