Letters to Editor

To the Editor:

Many of us grouse a lot about property taxes, and blame just about everybody except those actually responsible.

We blame high taxes on county commissioners, assessor, school board, city council or just about any public official who comes to mind.

Let's be fair and take the blame, or credit, ourselves. We alone can impose taxes without the public official, or governing body, can impose taxes with out the majority vote consent of those taxed.

Clackamas County property owners are well off, comparatively. In Oregon's 36 counties, Clackamas is sixth lowest for general county operating cost per capita and seventh in per capita property tax.

Statistically, Clackamas County's general county levy, including \$10 per census (age 4-9) child for the county school fund, has been decreasing. Ten years ago this levy was 12 mills. Last year it was 8.5 mills and for the 1964-65 tax year, 8.4 mills.

Clackamas County's per capita property tax is \$14.33 compared to our neighbors: Washington, \$17.01; Multnomah, \$37.82; Yamhill, \$28.59; Marion, \$15.88; Hood River, \$24.62; and Wasco, \$23.76.

Our votes on special levies, bond issues and budgets, and state laws enacted by the Legislative Assembly, control property taxation. So, we cannot blame the county assessor, who merely enforces the laws applying to assessments and computes tax rates your votes determine. Nor can we blame county commissioners, or any other public official or governing body, for taxes.

I'm glad the illegal placing of political signs of local candidates has at last been brought to the attention of the public. I have long been opposed to the clutter of political signs that break out like a virulent rash along the roads of Clackamas county every two years.
