Sandy Exchange Included In Telephone Expansion Plans

West Coast Telephone Company has announced a \$16 million construction budget for its three-state operation in 1965, including a record \$8 million for Oregon, according to Lyle Cross, Oregon division manager.

Cross said the \$8 million is the highest ever budgeted for Oregon and reflects the company's determination to provide "continued refinement and expansion of facilities throughout the state."

In addition to the \$8 million for Oregon, the budget includes \$7.5 million for Washington and \$380,000 for the West Coast Telephone Company of California.

A sizeable portion of the budget is concentrated in the Gresham district, which embraces the Gresham and Sandy exchanges as well as Boring-Orient, a part of the Gresham exchange.

Among major items in the Gresham district is \$68,060 for the relocation of the underground conduit system along Main street. This project is necessitated by the proposed widening and regrading of Main street, by the City of Gresham.

The existing conduit system is operating at capacity at the present time, and additional ducts are required to provide facilities for the anticipated growth of the city north of the company's central office, according to Curt Straw, district manager.

A comparable expenditure—\$65,640—will be made to make aerial cable additions in the Woodville-Troutdale areas.

An estimated \$29,580 will be spent to add 100 "truck hunting" terminals to the Gresham exchange. According to Straw, this project reflects a growth in "business telephone use" in the area, since this project is designed primarily to provide more service for commercial users.

Aerial cable relief along the Mt. Hood Loop highway from Straus street to Duncan road, and on the Sandy-Estacada highway and Bornstedt road, to Ulrich-Truble road, will be provided through a project that calls for \$22,870. Future growth

and the reduction of the number of parties on suburban lines are the principal considerations for this expenditure. The pole line also will be relocated to accommodate new highway construction, in the area.

A total of 100 lines and 100 terminals will be added to the Sandy exchange at a cost of \$6,010.

"These projects are designed to improve existing service and to keep pace with the growth of the area," Straw said, adding that the expenditure of \$8 million in Oregon emphasizes West Coast's "sensitivity to the needs and desires of its customers."

It has been forecast, Straw reported, that 6,700 phones will have been added to the West Coast system in Oregon by year's end.

As an example of the company's "sensitivity to customer needs and desires," Straw pointed out that the number of telephones with extended area service were increased from 74.8 per cent of all telephones in the system in 1963 to 83.4 per cent in 1964. By the end of 1965 it is believed the percentage will be 85.8.

Brightwood Extension News

The Brightwood Extension Unit held its regular meeting Jan. 14, at the home of Rosalie Collier. The project was given by Carol Conan and Diane Peterson on Health Insurance. We learned of the things to look for, such as if it covered both medical and hospital cost, if it could be cancelled, how long it would pay, and many other things that it could do for the policy holder.

It was voted to donate \$10 to the flood relief fund.

Next regular meeting is Feb. 11.
