HUGH GRAHAM FAUST

Hugh Graham Faust, 85, of Rt. 1, Box 367, Boring, died Jan. 24, after an extended illness. He was born in New Market, Tenn. in 1879, one of seven children.

He attended Maury high school in Dandridge, Tenn., Carson Newman college and Tusculum Presbyterian school, where he received his B. S. degree. He was principal of LaFollette high school in 1906 and of Jacksboro high school, both in Tennessee. In 1908 he received his M. A. degree from the University of Chicago. While there he met Bertha Wyman Fox and they were married Dec. 25, 1909.

From 1911 to 1914 he was superintendent of schools in Weatherford and Frederick, Okla., and at Shawnee, Okla., from 1914 to 1932. He was in the department of education of Oklahoma from 1932 to 1934, in 1937 was placed in charge of the extension service.

In 1950 he retired from professional life and came to Oregon to settle on land he had bought 20 years before. He and his wife cleared the 20 acres and built their home in sight of Mt. Hood's summit. Mr. Faust farmed until his health failed in 1963.

He was a 15 year member of Rotary, of the Masonic Order and Scottish Rite and Knights of Pythias and served in the court of honor of the Boy Scouts from 1916 to 1926. In 1917 he was made a life member of the National Education Assn. He was an elder in the Presbyterian church 15 years.

He is survived by his wife, Bertha, son, William R. of Washington D. C., Dr. H. H. Faust, his other son, preceded him in death. He also is survived by two brothers, Dr. Glenn Faust of Venice, and Lynn Faust of The Dalles.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at Bateman funeral chapel with interment at Oak Lawn cemetery in Corvallis.

Death Takes G. A. TenEyck

George Albert TenEyck, 77, Rt. 1, Box 708, Sandy, well known as a U. S. forest service employee, died Monday, Jan. 25, at Barnes veterans hospital in Vancouver. He had suffered a heart attack some two weeks earlier.

Mr. TenEyck was born Nov. 20, 1887, at Marmot, Ore. He attended school at Marmot and had spent most of his life in that area. For over 10 years he was employed by the forest service and for more than 10 years worked for the city of Portland water department as a road foreman. For many years he had been a farmer.

He served during World War I in the U. S. army and was a Gresham member of the American Legion and Veterans of W. W. I Barracks #2614, Gresham. On July 22, 1918, at Cherryville he married Lillian B. Averill.

Taxpayers: Use Account Numbers

Taxpayers were reminded today by A. G. Erickson, Director of Internal Revenue for Oregon, that under present law they are required to enter their identifying "tax account" numbers on 1964 income tax returns filed in 1965.

For the individual, this is his social security number, or similar number issued for tax reporting purposes if he has never had employment under social security coverage.

Use of identifying numbers is essential to electronic data processing of returns, now being used nationwide by Internal Revenue. Mr. Erickson said. He added that failure to enter the account number will delay any refund due.
