Board Tells Attorney To Draw Up Resolution

Sandy Elementary School District No. 46 Attorney Paul Biggs was instructed Monday night to draw up a resolution and present at the next board meeting for a bond election for more classrooms and a municipal swimming pool under the jurisdiction of the local district. Chairman of the School Board Hazel Murray conducted the meeting which included representatives of various civic and service clubs in attendance.

Considerable discussion was held among the board members and their attorney regarding a school bond election for the new classrooms and swimming pool. The board chairman opened the discussion to the visiting representatives who expressed their own viewpoints. Persons present represented the Kiwanis Club of Sandy, Sandy Jaycees, Sandy Jayettes, Sandy Area Chamber of Commerce, Sandy Lions Club, Sandy Woman's Club, the Sandy Business and Professional Woman's Club, Sandy PTA and Moms and Dads Club. Each person who spoke for their organization indicated an interest in seeing a swimming pool built. A question of how it is to be financed was brought up and how other school districts when using the facility would be charged, etc.

Following the pros and cons of setting up a bond election on a combination basis including the pool and classrooms all together it was decided to have one ballot with separate items.

Nelson Receives IED Position

Edward Nelson of Sandy won the Zone 5 position in the Clackamas County Intermediate Education District voting held during the school elections. Here received a total of 552 votes.

Chamber Talks Vote Situation

Members of the Sandy Area Chamber of Commerce discussed "How to Get the Voters Out" for the community college election that will be held in June during their regular business Tuesday. The group met at the Trail Cafe.

Various remarks were tossed back and forth relative to the poor showing of voters during the recent budget elections for both the city and the schools. Then the question of how to get people in the community interested enough to come out and vote was brought up.

Capt. I. S. Hartman, chamber secretary, gave a rundown on the present community college project stating that polls would be set up at the elementary schools in the district and be open from 2 to 8 p.m. on the voting date. He proposed that posters be set up throughout the community on the day prior to the election urging and reminding citizens to vote. Another suggestion was telephone brigade calling every person in the area encouraging them to get out and vote.

Other organizations in the area will be contacted and asked to help push voting this time. Hartman is a candidate for director on the college's board. He is the lone candidate from this area and the chamber, as well as other local groups are urging voters to support his candidacy for the post.

A short discussion relative to the proposed swimming pool was also held. Olin Bignall gave a report on the school board meeting held Monday night and for the benefit of those who were not at previous chamber sessions explained the reasons favoring a larger pool to be built here.

Bob Grokett, vice president, presided at the meeting in the absence of President Neil Jackson.

Members of the school board expressed unity among themselves in the need for a swimming pool facility here and more classrooms. After discussions they voted to put both items on the ballot.

The classroom bond would include a 12-room class unit and administrative offices to be built on a site separate from the present school buildings. Also present at the meeting was Mr. Donald W. Edmundson, a partner in a Gresham architect firm who has presented preliminary sketches for the swimming pool.

The resolution for the bond election will be presented to the school board members on Monday, May 17, at an adjourned regular meeting by the attorney reported Clyde Sutherland, school superintendent.

In other business bids for a new school bus were opened. All bids submitted were turned to the Bus Transportation Committee for study.
