Speaking of the project she was somewhat pessimistic beforehand as she remarked, "we hope this to be a source of education and recreation for the students."

Explaining the method to be used she went on to say "Our idea was not just to draw these animals, but to give them a bit of the modern trend, as well some movement by the 'double exposure'. In beginning our work, we drew an animal from one angle. Then, right over this animal we use another color to draw the same animal in another position."

"Then, the figure is colored in three colors, filling in the sections made by both drawings. In this way, the outline is not clearly seen, but it can be observed by studying."

Sandy Businessman Delegate to Presbyterian General Assembly

Howard Berger, a ruling elder from the Session of the Community Presbyterian church of Sandy, has been elected as a Commissioner-delegate to the 177th General Assembly of the United Presbyterian church in the U.S.A., to be held next week in Columbus, Ohio.

As one of 835 commissioners representing 189 Presbyteries in the United States, Berger will represent Portland Presbytery at the week long meeting. Portland Presbytery has a total of 6 delegates, half of whom are elders and half ministers.

Beginning on May 20, the Assembly will function to carry on the work of the United Presbyterian church in three areas; legislative, judicial and administrative. In their role as the chief legislators for the church, commissioners act on overtures (proposals) submitted by the presbyteries, and on reports of committees formed by previous Assemblies, and they initiate action such as the tra-

ditional pronouncements.

As the highest court of the church the assembly votes on decisions rendered by the Judicial Commission. Cases come before them on appeal from the presbyteries or synods.

Commissioners serve as ad-

ministrators when they review the accomplishments and plans of general assembly and its standing committees.

Berger will fly by jet from Portland on May 19, and expects to return on May 26.
