

BEFORE THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF CLACKAMAS COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON

Order No. 1207
In the matter of the petition of the City of Sandy to acquire jurisdiction over a certain county road lying within the city limits of the City of Sandy, Clackamas County, State of Oregon.

Main Street
This matter coming before the Board of County Commissioners at this time and it appearing that the governing body of the City of Sandy, Clackamas County, Oregon, by Resolution is requesting that the jurisdiction of the following described county road located within and adjacent to the corporate limits of the City of Sandy, Clackamas County, Oregon, be relinquished by the County and conveyed to the City of Sandy as provided for in O.R.S. 37-270. The Main Street in the City of Sandy from the West at South Bluff Street to the East at Highway 26, where it intersects with Highway 26.

It further appearing to the Board that under O.R.S. 37-270 a notice shall be given by publishing in a newspaper of general circulation in the County for four successive weeks, the time and place of hearing of the proposed transfer of jurisdiction of said road from Clackamas County to the City of Sandy, now therefore IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that a hearing will be held in the Board of Commissioners' Room, Room 201, Clackamas County, Oregon, on the 7th day of July, 1965, at 10:00 a.m. to consider any objections or testimony offered by any person interested and to further consider if it is to the best interest of the County to surrender the jurisdiction over the within mentioned County road to the City of Sandy, and if it is hereby directed to have published in the Sandy Post, a newspaper of general circulation in the County, once a week for four consecutive weeks, that a hearing will be held at 10:00 a.m. in the County Court House, Oregon City, Oregon, Room 201, on the 7th day of July, 1965 on the within entitled matter and to consider any objections or testimony offered by any person interested and to determine whether or not it is to the best interest of the County to surrender jurisdiction over the within mentioned County road to the City of Sandy.

The auditorium of the elementary school of said School District No. 46, Sandy, Clackamas County, Oregon.

There will be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of contracting bonded indebtedness in the amounts, and for the purposes as follows:
PROPOSITION NO. I:
To remodel, alter, construct, repair and improve the existing elementary school building in said School District No. 46, and to furnish and equip the same; and to construct, maintain, improve, furnish and equip a new school building and grounds on a new site to be purchased and which will be located within said School District No. 46, for a total sum of \$445,000.00.
PROPOSITION NO. II:
To construct, maintain and operate a swimming pool on the site now owned by School District No. 46, and to furnish and equip the same including dressing rooms thereon, and to improve the grounds surrounding said swimming pool, including black-topping thereof, for the total sum of \$135,000.00. Said school building and property herein mentioned is within the boundaries of School District No. 46, Clackamas County.

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Workmen Are Electrocuted

Electrocuted Wednesday of last week in a mishap at Barton was Charles Elmer Hadden, a 49-year-old Portland laborer. A second man was hospitalized in Gresham General Hospital with third-degree burns as a result of the accident.

Hadden was pronounced dead upon arrival at the same hospital.

Listed in satisfactory condition was Austin Lanciaos, 33, of Portland. He suffered burns on both hands and feet.

The mishap occurred at a gravel operation of Roy L. Houck Sons Corp., near Barton Park on the Clackamas River off Highway 212.

According to reports Jeral L. Woods, Portland, was operating a truck crane and the two other men were standing on the ground guiding the conveyor when the steel crane bumped into a 12,500 volt, overhead power line, conducting the electricity to the ground. Woods escaped injury.

Time of the accident was about 1:40 p.m. The victims were taken to the hospital about an hour later by Rocket Ambulance Co., of Milwaukie.
