Get Out the Stopwatches

We hadn't realized it, and we doubt that many of our readers did either, but telephone and door-to-door solicitors will face a new hazard in Oregon, come Saturday.

That's the effective date of a new law, passed by the last legislature, which requires telephone and door-to-door solicitors to identify themselves within 30 seconds. Within the same 30 seconds, they must tell whom they represent and the true purpose of their call.

The law purportedly is aimed at "fly-by-night operators", particularly in the home improvement field.

We can see all sorts of problems. Take the 30 seconds, for instance.

We know a lot of salesmen, in no sense fly-by-nighters, who can't get warmed up in 30 seconds. Moreover, who will hold the stopwatch?

Such a law apparently assumes that all telephone and door-to-door solicitors are scoundrels if they don't immediately make their pitch apparent. This just isn't the case.

We've received, and been annoyed, by all sorts of over-the-phone sales pitches, but we've never had much trouble fending them off if we weren't interested. Maybe the gullible need state protection, but we wonder if something of this nature is the right idea.

Puckett Attends Education Specialists Institute at OSU

Bennie D. Puckett, a 7th grade teacher at Sandy elementary school, is among a group of 50 northwest teachers and librarians being trained this summer as "educational media specialists" at an eight-week institute being conducted by Oregon's Division of Continuing Education.

In mid-August Mr. Puckett will complete eight weeks of extensive training in instructional uses of the educational media -- films, television, radio, tape recordings, and other graphic teaching aids.

"We're not training these people as 'gadgets', says Dr. William Wells, associate director of the media institute. 'We're trying to send them back to their schools with ideas that will improve communication in teaching.' Dr. Wells notes that the federally subsidized institute marks the first time audiovisual instruction techniques have been taught in an extensive program for active school teachers and librarians.

"No matter how many gadgets you furnish the teacher," Wells says, "unless you've increased the amount of learning that takes place in the student, then your training has been worthless."

Puckett was selected as one of the participants in the institute program early this year from applicants in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Alaska and Hawaii. The Oregon Institute is one of several throughout the nation teaching educational media techniques in a program financed by the National Defense Education Act. Institute participants are taught how to use the most advanced types of audiovisual teaching aids now available to



teachers. They are trained to evaluate the quality of a teaching aid and its usefulness in the classroom. In addition, the participants learn to produce different types of audiovisual aids economically for their schools. After completion of the in-

stitute Puckett and other participants will return to their schools to serve as part-time or full-time educational media specialists. They will administer the audiovisual instruction programs and advise fellow teachers on the uses of today's modern teaching aids.

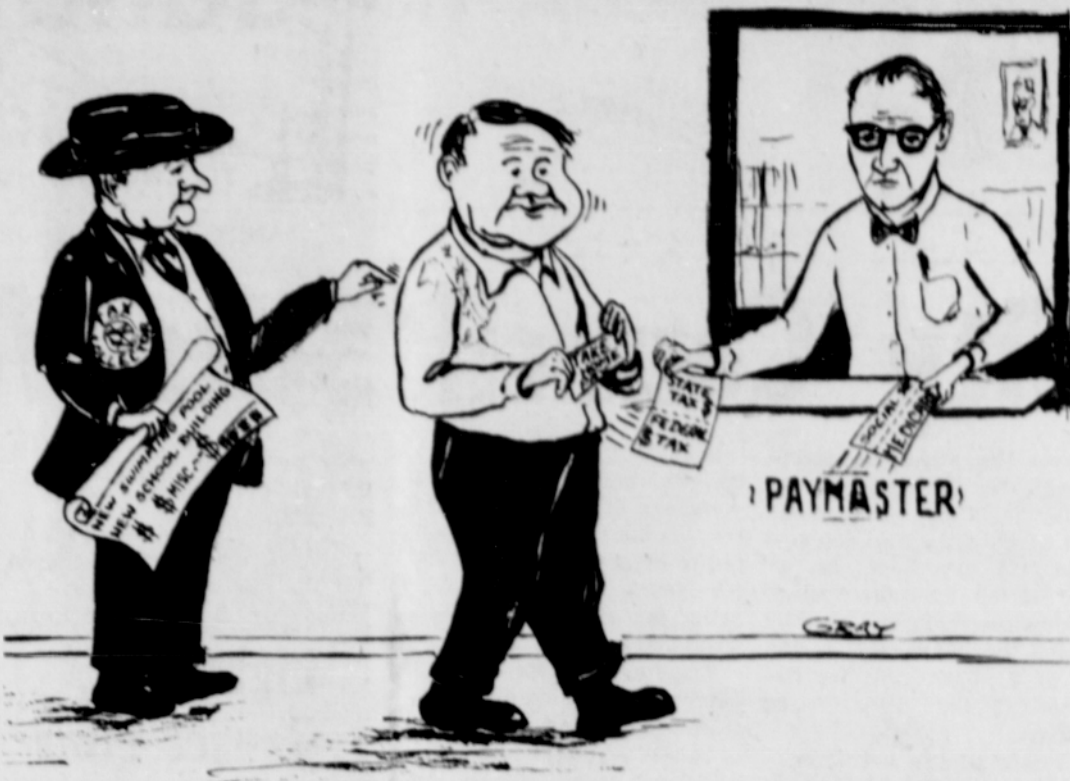
Road Projects Due In Clackamas County

Oregon State Highway Commission on Aug. 31 in Salem will open bids on two projects in Clackamas county. One involves slope protection and the other slide removal.

The slope protection project involves providing reinforced concrete slope protection along about a mile of the Zig Zag River bridge section of the Mt. Hood highway (U. S. 26)

near the town of Rhododendron. Completion date is set for Oct. 15, 1965.

The other project involves slide removal and protecting slopes and riprap on the Clackamas river (Carver) slide section on FAS 131 about two miles west of Carver. The project is 0.27 mile in length. Completion date is set for Nov. 15, 1965.
