April 1 is the deadline by law for senior citizens, disabled veterans and veterans' widows to apply for these benefits. Unless they do apply in time and qualify, they are ineligible for the deferments and exemptions.

Not long after World War II Oregon passed a law that qualified disabled veterans for exemptions. For the most part, it stipulated that a veteran is one who served at least 90 days in a U.S. war or military or expeditionary action and qualified for the American Expeditionary Medal. It also requires that a veteran must be declared at least 40 per cent disabled by the Veterans Administration. A disabled veteran may apply for tax exemptions up to \$7,500 in true cash value.

Unmarried widows of war veterans are eligible for tax exemptions. They can apply for benefits up to \$7,500 in true cash value.

Tax exemptions on the first \$10,000 in true cash value of their personal and real properties is considered to senior citizens here who make application. Properties beyond that sum must be paid at the normal rate.

Senior citizens applying for these benefits must prove their age and should have their Social Security cards or numbers available when applying. The assessor indicated that their adjusted gross income must be less than \$2,500, too. Exemptions apply according to their age and adjust gross income as it applies here, Hattan said, included all income in the family.
