You don't have to go to Alaska to see Sled Dog races! In fact why not plan to see the 2 day race planned for Feb. 12 and 13, known as the Mount Hood Race, to be held at Frog Lake, about 7 miles past Government Camp? Children would enjoy seeing the competition, too.

County Receives First Voting Machines; More Coming Soon

The first 46 automatic voting machines purchased by the County of Clackamas arrived recently in Oregon City. The remainder of the 230 voting machines originally purchased are scheduled to arrive shortly after the first of this year. To help acquaint voters with their operation, County Clerk Robert Schumaker said the machines will be placed on display in a number of places throughout the county.

This county is the first in Oregon to purchase the machines. A number of other counties, however, are contemplating such a purchase. The machines are a source of speeding up election returns.

Automatic voting machines have been in use for years in Washington state and have been used extensively in the Midwest. The cost of one voting machine is \$1,550. The total county order will amount to \$356,000 but the machines are expected to drastically reduce the \$40,000 expense for each election the county clerk stated. Schumaker explained that the machines are self contained,
