Last Rites Held for Prominent Dentist

Funeral rites were held on Tuesday of this week for Dr. Harvey A. Schneider, prominent dentist here. Schneider died at his home Friday. He has practiced dentistry in Sandy since 1926.

Born in Ephrata, Wash. on Feb. 11, 1893 he attended schools in the Lusted-Cottrell district and graduated from North Pacific Dental College in 1918. Dr. Schneider practiced dentistry in Pilot Rock, Pendleton, and Brookings prior to moving to Sandy in 1926. He continued his practice here until his death.

Dr. Schneider was active in city and civic affairs having served as city recorder for Sandy for a number of years. He was a former member of the Sandy Grade School board, a member of Sandy Area Chamber of Commerce and Kiwanis Club of Sandy. The deceased was also a member of the Clackamas County Dental Association, Oregon Dental Association and Pilot Rock Masonic Lodge No. 165.

The Tuesday services were held at Bateman Funeral Chapel in Gresham with private vault interment at Sandy Cemetery. Married in South Haven, Michigan on Oct. 10, 1923 the dentist leaves as his widow Verona L. Schneider. Other survivors include two sons, Keith and Dean of Sandy, and a daughter, Mrs. Jack Strom of Redwood City, Calif. Three

sisters and eight grandchildren also survive. His sisters are Mrs. B. L. Wolfe, Yachats, Mrs. Orville Wells, Independence, and Mrs. Emil Swanson of Springfield.

Plans for Outdoor Summer Restaurant In Sandy Told

Preparations are now being made for a unique outdoor summer restaurant facility here. This announcement was made by Robert Pullen, operator of the Janz Berryland, on Monday of this week.

The two-acre summer restaurant will be located in the same area as the present fruit and berry stand at the west city limits of town along the Loop Highway. According to Pullen 60 tables with tilted umbrellas of different colors will dot the grounds. Also 22 different variety of trees are being planted. A total of 376 poplar trees will line the area and there will be two colored water fountains designed in the eating area.

Joining with Pullen in the promotion of the summer restaurant are Denny Gray and Denny Myers, both of Sandy. Gray has been at work designing the project for several months. Myers was recently inducted into the military service and has another year and a half to complete his obligation there, then will return to help with the restaurant and other pond with the various selling

activities the trio are planning.

When put into operation the restaurant will be operated by Frank Schmitz and Mable Pullen. Schmitz operated a restaurant business here on Main Street for a number of years. As Pullen stated "Frank will be preparing the same delicious food he served in his former restaurant."

In recent weeks improvements have been under way on the present berry and fruit stand, too. A 42 ft. by 64 ft. concrete slab floor inside the building has been poured and the overhanging roof taken off the front of the stand. A new cider room was built in the east corner of the building while a 16 ft. by 16 ft. walk-in cooler for seasonal fruit storage has been built. At the west end of the building an opening to allow patrons to the summer restaurant area was built.

A noticeable addition to the front of the stand is a new sign. The sign reads "Janz Appleland." Pullen said the sign on the building will be changed four times a year to corres-

pond to the seasons. For instance, he explained at this time we are using "Appleland" while apples are our main selling item. When the plant and shrubbery season rolls in we'll change the sign to read "Plantland," then it will go to "Berryland" as the strawberries, raspberries, etc., arrive, and lastly to "Fruitland" as peaches, pears, cherries, and apricots are on the scene.

Other additions that are planned in the near future include a flower shop and a seafood market. The flower shop will be handled by Mrs. Schmitz and carry a wide assortment of potted flowers, as well as cut flowers. A large crab pot is planned for the seafood market, too, he added.

Mentioning the fruit and produce handled by the stand Pullen commented that these items are bought directly from the farmer and put on sale at the stand. One of his biggest suppliers in this manner is Chuck Picking of Hood River. "He has some of the very finest orchards in the country," concluded Pullen.

Block Walls Go Up At Phone Firm Site

The Hoodland Telephone Company Improvement project is well underway and soon it will be providing service to its customers with the most modern equipment available, according to Charles Augustine, owner of the company.

A new telephone exchange, that is now nearing completion, is being erected near the old office in Welches. The exchange will have a 300 line, 700 terminal equipment and is designed to be expanded to an 800 line, 1200 terminal facility.

The present 3 digit system of 1,2,4 and 10 party service where all rings register, will give way to all-number 7 digit dialing with 1,2 and 4 party

service with fully selective rings. "No more counting, when your phone rings you will know the call is for you," said Augustine.

"Direct Distance Dialing" will be another convenience made possible by the new installation.

Much of the material for the job has already arrived and more is en route, including the many miles of cable required for the 100% cable installation that is planned for the company's entire territory. The actual cable installation will be done by an experienced contracting company, the owner said, although his own crew will be kept busy on smaller features of the undertaking. He gave mid-summer as the time when the entire project would be completed and in use.

Proud of the expansion and modernization of his company, Augustine related that the original phone service on Mt. Hood began 38 years ago with the Bear Creek Co., which set up a magneto at Zig Zag and eventually served 18 stations before it was taken over by Frank Christensen and his father.

"When I bought the company seven years ago we were serving 250 phones. Now, he said, we have about 450 subscribers and expect within five years that number will increase to 1000 stations."
