

Household Hints

Clean, bright, odor-free appliances in the kitchen are a delight to have and a joy to use. A clean refrigerator works better and at lower cost. A weekly cleaning just before your weekly shopping helps you check supplies and keeps your refrigerator bright. Defrost when about 1/4 inch of frost is formed on the coils says Barbara Duncan, Multnomah County Extension Agent.

For quick defrosting: turn the cold control to off. Remove frozen foods from the freezer compartment and wrap well in newspapers to prevent thawing. Replace ice cube trays with small pans of hot water. When the frost is melted, wash surfaces with a solution of 1 tablespoon of baking soda in one quart of warm water. Rinse with clear water and dry. Reset the cold control and replace frozen foods and ice cube trays. Clean and remove odors from the fresh food storage section at the same time, using soda and water as in the freezer. Rinse with a cloth wrung out in clear water and dry with a clean cloth.

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Missionary Conference Set At Sandy Assembly of God

Rev. and Mrs. Engelgau from Upper Volta, West Africa and Rev. and Mrs. David Godwin from El Salvador Central America will be the missionaries featured at the World Missions Convention to be held at the Sandy Assembly of God church Feb. 18, 19, and 20.

The Engelgaus and their two children first went as missionaries to Upper Volta in 1953. They studied language for some time in Paris and also Ouagadougou the capital of Upper Volta before beginning their service in the Boromo area. The Engelgaus were the first to introduce Christianity to this area. In all they have now spent three terms and built numerous churches in the area.

The Godwin family has just returned to the states following their first term in Central America. The Godwin family are outstanding musicians and will be singing in the convention each night.

Other speakers during the convention will include, Rev. Earl Book pastor from Albany and director of missions in the Ore. Council of the Assemblies of God. Also Rev. N. D. Davidson from Salem who is the Superintendent of the Oregon Council of the Assemblies of God and a world missions leader for many years.

Interesting features of the convention will include films of the mission fields, a black

light presentation by Rev. Godwin and a typical missions scene skit presented by the Engelgau family.

The purpose of the convention is to inform and inspire the congregation and interested friends concerning the urgent needs for missions in these days. Also the church which gave nearly four thousand dollars to missions last year is endeavoring to increase its giving to this cause in the coming year.

Pastor Rose and the congregation invites all to attend. You will enjoy the music as well as the very interesting presentation of missions each night.

Missions films will be shown at 6:45 Friday and Sat. with the services beginning at 7:30. On Sunday the missionaries will be speaking in each department of the Sunday school and Rev. Davidson will speak at the 11:00 a.m. service. At 6:00 in the evening another film will be shown followed at 7:00 by Rev. Godwin speaking.

Mrs. Barbara Hadley, who with her husband is a newly appointed missionary to Borneo, will speak at the Ladies Missionary Society of the Sandy Baptist Chapel on Feb. 17 at 7:30 p.m.

In Indonesia, the Hadleys will work among the Dyak tribesmen in Kalimantan Barat, or West Borneo. They will go out under the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society, Wheaton, Ill., and will assist other CBFFMS missionaries in starting churches in the villages and operating a hospital and dispensaries.

After completing high school, Hadley received his B.S. from Oregon College of Education. Mrs. Hadley graduated from Emanuel Hospital of Nursing. After they were married, Hadley taught mathematics in a high school in Salem for a year. In 1962 he resigned to attend Western Conservative Baptist seminary, from which he graduated in June of 1965.

Prior to going to Indonesia, the Hadleys will complete an extensive speaking tour in churches and conferences through the area.

Speaker Slated by Missionary Society

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Leader of the Band

"This is my pride and joy," beamed Fred Proett, Sandy's band leader, as he displayed the original manuscripts from the Gregorian Chant, Proett had just returned from a trip to San Francisco where he purchased the manuscripts, beautifully done on parchment.

Proett divides his time between Sandy high and grade schools. Each morning he arrives at the high school by 7:30 a.m., where at this early hour on Tuesdays and Thursdays he meets with the dance band. He is highly in favor of small groups as "most students learn best in small groups; when the group is too large the individual never gets the opportunity to sink or swim, so to speak." He went on to say, "A small ensemble player is a much better musician than one who doesn't have this opportunity."

The high school varsity band is currently preparing for its concert to be held in March, and for the February 17 Wilco League Festival.

About the beginners band, in which students are learning to play horns, Proett had this to say, "It's one of the best beginner's band I've ever had, and one of the most satisfying classes I have. Each student is doing fairly well."

Each morning Proett teaches three periods of different bands at the high school.

"One of the things we're trying to do is to prepare the young person to have a good music response on his own - or to be independent. I want him to rely on his own training. The pep band is a good example of this. I try to leave it up to them as much as possible. But, of course, I'm always there if they need me."

Every afternoon finds Proett at the grade school where each day he works with six different groups. He said, "I have some good groups at the grade school. It takes awhile to get acquainted with 250 students right off the bat, with so many it's difficult to help each individual, as you don't know or understand his background etc." He emphasized that the student who starts playing in the fifth grade has a different attitude than the one who starts as a freshman.

There were two new practice rooms built over the Christmas holidays, so the pupils can work in them without being disturbed by music coming from the other rooms.

"Probably the most difficult part of my job," Proett remarked, "is having to jump from one age group to another. I have the 4th through 12th grades - and I like them all. They have started to talk of splitting the departments - it is really needed."

Originally from Wayne, Nebraska, Proett graduated from Nebraska State College where he received his degree in music. He taught in his home state for five years before coming to Sandy.

Of teaching music he says, "You teach such an intangible

subject, to begin with, you can't get anything concrete - like teaching a blind man the basic colors." Music he said is basically 3 - fold technique, which is the method of procedure; musical notation and rhythms, being able to understand what's on the written page; and interpretation, to be able to translate what is being learned.

"If I don't believe in a thing and enjoy doing it, I don't do it," says Sandy's Band Leader, "I either go all out for it or not at all. For instance, if I feel like doing the dishes I do them, if not, they don't get done."

It's very evident from his abounding enthusiasm, he means business, and certainly feels that music should have a place in the life of every individual.
