'How to Sew With Wool' Class Starts Saturday, February 19

Basic sewing techniques needed when working with wool will be discussed. Pressing, bound buttonholes, zipper application, sleeves and hems are topics to be covered. Samples of inner facing and lining fab-

rics will be on display. Although geared for the 4-H member, Miss Meyer states that mothers and 4-H leaders are welcome to attend.

News and Views about Mt. Hood Community College

Beginning with this week's issue, the editors of this newspaper are kindly making this space available for what will be a continuing series of reports about progress and plans for the development of Mt. Hood Community College. Since an important duty of a college president, together with the help of the community, is to identify the needs and interests of the area the college serves, it is hoped that this column will be used regularly by the people to express their views and their needs.

It seems to me that we have a two-fold need for a regular column such as this one. First it gives me, my staff and faculty a chance to communicate with you. Second, we want to hear from you, either in the form of contributing articles, phone calls, or a letter, about any phase of the community college and how you think we can develop a highly effective program here.

It has already been gratifying to us to have heard from several interested citizens who have volunteered to help us in developing our course offerings. Among those we have talked to are horticulturists Ed Wood and Larry Aylsworth and automobile dealer Ross Fanning. You know, one of the most exciting things about the community college movement is its ability to respond to change. A college responsive to the community's needs may discard outdated courses and add necessary new ones which, incidentally, keeps our training programs in tune with the times while saving its citizens valuable tax dollars.

For this reason, among many, we would like to establish a number of citizens' advisory committees to help us identify community needs. In addition, we hope to establish advisory committees consisting of high school juniors and seniors who are just as concerned about their future education as are their parents. We want to keep in touch with all areas of the community and to be responsive to their needs insofar as possible. One of the first things we would like to ask of our area high school students is to help us select a college seal and nickname. We would like to ask our proposed facilities committee to help us find suitable space to begin offering courses until our permanent campus is built at

the 75-acre, government donated site at NE 148th and Halsey streets.

I know that many of you have heard the term "comprehensive" college being used in connection with Mt. Hood Community College. This simply means a college responsive to all of the local educational and cultural needs of its citizens. It means offering appropriate vocational-technical courses to aid our young people going into the job market. Comprehensive also means offering the traditional first two years of college transfer work. One of the significant things about a community college is its ability to offer low cost, fully transferable college courses. Students save on tuition, housing and transportation costs, and in most cases, can save enough to make it possible to go on to a four-year college or university to study for the bachelor's degree.

Comprehensive means offering adults a wider range of courses to assist in job retraining, adding new skills, increasing understanding of the world around us or simply to add to the value of their leisure activities. Comprehensive also means enriching the cultural and artistic resources of a community.

Finally, comprehensive means that business and industry, working with the college, can be assured of a pool of highly-trained young people. These young people can benefit from increasing employment opportunities and, at the same time, can substantially aid in the growing prosperity of the area because their advanced training increases their earning power. Here everyone benefits.

In the coming weeks, as we begin to develop our course offering plans, or building plans, and our cultural plans, we will keep you informed as to our progress. We hope that you will help us in this endeavor. Your comments, views, and suggestions are essential to us if we, together, are going to build a community college in which all of us can take pride. MARY ELIZABETH DENTON

Mary Elizabeth Denton, 86, of Rt. 1, Box 214, Sandy, died at a local hospital on Feb. 12. Mrs. Denton was born Mary Elizabeth Adamson, Aug. 10, 1879 at Waterloo, Iowa.

As a youngster Mrs. Denton moved from Iowa to Indiana. In 1899, the year of the Land Rush, she and her family moved into Oklahoma where she attended and graduated from Central State Normal school. On April 6, 1900 in Oklahoma she married Walter Denton. In the same year they moved to Leadville, Colo. Nine years later, in 1909 they moved to Twin Falls, Ida. She lived there until 1933 when they made their home at Puyallup, Wash. In 1959 they moved to Sandy.

Denton died in 1960. She taught school while living in Oklahoma, and during the war years was employed as a seamstress on a military base. She attended the Presbyterian church, and was a member of the Daughters of the Union Army.

The surviving members of her family include four children, Burton L. of Sandy, Willard of Grants Pass, Alton of Bogata, Colombia, South America, and Mrs. R. R. (Ruby) Paxton of Scottsdale, Ariz.; 13 grandchildren; one brother, Harry Adamson of Riverbank, Calif.; and one sister, Mrs. Goldie Moore of Edmond, Okla. Funeral services were held Feb. 16 in the chapel of Carroll Funeral Home. Entombment was in Lincoln Memorial, Portland, with Rev. Ed Neuenfeldt officiating.

LEROY RADFORD

Leroy Radford, 78, of 2304 S. E. 101st St., Portland, died at his home of a heart attack Feb. 12. Radford was born May 13, 1887 at Omaha, Neb.

At the age of nine he and his family moved to the Cottrell community. In 1908 he moved to Tacoma, Wash., where he lived and worked until 1913, when he returned to Oregon, making his home at Highlands, (Estacada area). A few years later he returned to Tacoma.

While living in Washington, he was an employee of the Standard Oil Co., for over 21 years. Around 1930 he returned to the farm at Cottrell. In 1961 he sold the farm, and retired from farming, and moved to the east Portland address. He was known for his love of flowers, and by the helping hand he extended to all of his neighbors. He was a member of the Cottrell Baptist church.

The surviving members of his family include the widow, Hulda, whom he married, Dec. 28, 1911 at Tacoma, Wash.; two children, Harry Radford of Tacoma, and Mrs. J. R.
